Presenters in the Program Track on Lead and Healthy Homes Grant Management, Successful Program Implementation and Evaluation come from local government agencies, community organizations, non-profit groups and private consulting firms who have demonstrated successful track records in the development and implementation of Lead Hazard Control programs, Healthy Homes programs, Lead Elimination Action Programs, and Lead and Healthy Homes Demonstration grants, and in the design and submission of grant applications.

Presenters in the Program Track on Eliminating Childhood Lead Poisoning and Conducting Healthy Homes Programs come from public health departments, housing and community development agencies, research institutions, health educators, community organizations and parents who have undertaken lead screening programs, primary prevention programs, community education and outreach activities, and asthma intervention programs.

Presenters in the Program Track on Lead Hazard Control and Healthy Healthy Housing Technologies for Environmental Professionals, Building Owners and Managers, and Remediation Contractors come from the lead industry, environmental consulting companies, laboratories, inspection and risk assessment firms, contracting companies, and facilities who have successfully undertaken environmental hazard prevention, inspection and remediation projects, and who have proven track records in the development and implementation of hazard identification and remediation programs.

Presenters will also include state and federal officials engaged in the development and management of programs administered through the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the Environmental Protection Agency, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention; national leaders from policy organizations and health advocacy groups.

What New Opportunities and Challenges Face Public Agencies, Community Organizations, Private Industry, Facility Managers and Owners, and Educational Institutions as HUD, EPA, CDC and USDA Pursue the "Framework for Healthy Housing"?

In June 2011 in Denver, these federal agencies conducted an exciting and visionary conference on "Building A Framework For Healthy Housing". That conference focused attention on the need to provide safe, healthy and efficient homes for America's families and reflected the federal commitment to lay the foundation to achieve their healthy homes agenda.

The New Orleans conference will strive to advance the challenge of developing a national strategy for making our nation's homes and buildings healthy places to live and work through innovative programs, public/private collaborations and local/state/federal partnerships.

EXHIBIT HALL FLOOR PLAN

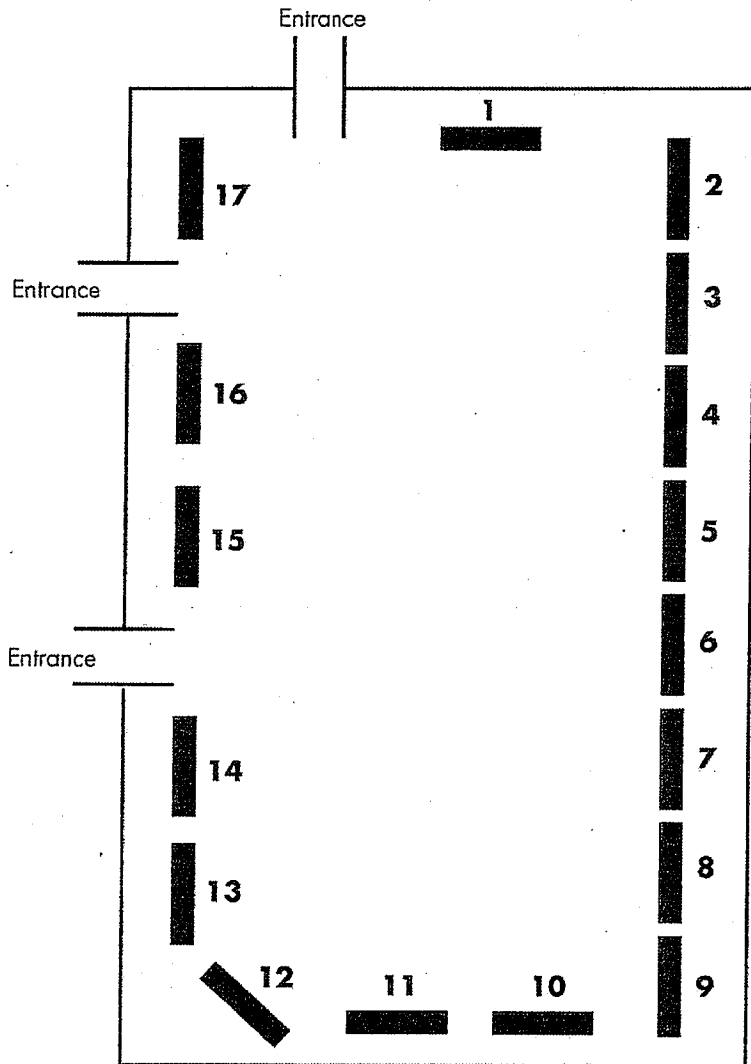

Airport Transportation

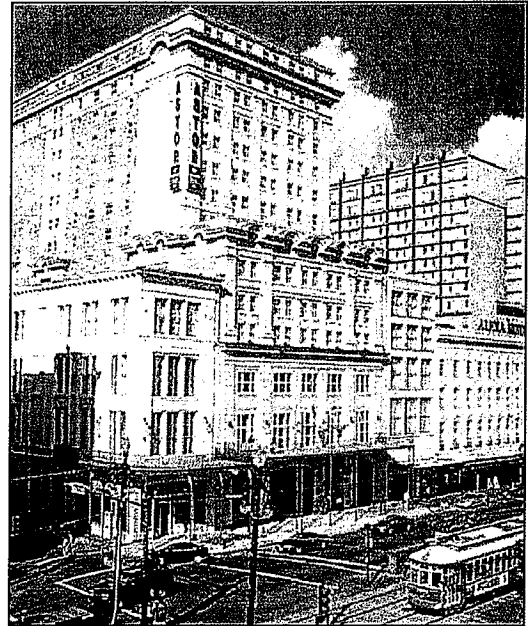
A fee-based city service is available at the airport baggage claim terminal to the hotel. The hotel's concierge service can arrange advance reservations for your return trip to the airport.
