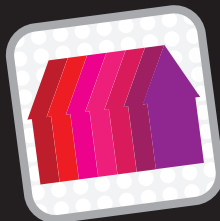

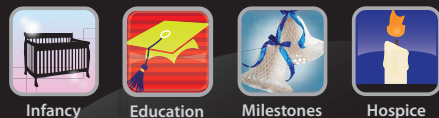

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The 140th APHA Annual Meeting theme, *Prevention and Wellness Across the Life Span*, presents an opportunity to discuss the impact prevention and wellness have on health, both physical and mental, at all ages.

Public health deals with diverse populations undergoing life course transitions. Theme related sessions at the Annual Meeting will look at a full range of environmental, social and behavioral issues that impact health across the life span. Gestational and childhood environmental exposures and adolescent patterns of behavior and lifestyle choices affect current and future health. Early life behaviors shape the quality of life as we age and negative behaviors may lead to increased rates of chronic disease. Critical behaviors across the life span that will be addressed include healthy dietary habits, physical activity, stress reduction and avoidance of exposure to tobacco and excessive alcohol consumption.

Social environmental factors such as family, peer group, school, and community influences also contribute to challenges across the life span. Workplace exposures and changes in the physical and social environment play a significant role in how we age. To accomplish the goal of wellness for all, government agencies, community organizations, schools, healthcare organizations and families must work together in a comprehensive approach.

Join APHA as we examine the range of effective public health intervention that can be used to change unhealthy patterns of behavior, and discuss how prevention and wellness fit into the current plan for health care reform.

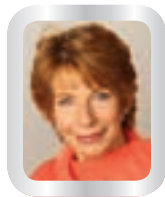

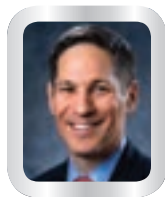
### Gail Sheehy

As the best-selling author of 15 books, Gail Sheehy has rocked the culture and changed the way millions of women and men around the world look at the stages of their lives. She offers dynamic programs based on her ground-breaking investigations and observations of the lives of men and women within different phases of their lives and how they can enjoy them to the fullest.

Ms. Sheehy's revolutionary *Passages* remained on *The New York Times* best-seller list for more than three years and has been reprinted in 28 languages. A Library of Congress survey named *Passages* one of the 10 most influential books of our time.

As a literary journalist, Ms. Sheehy was one of the original contributors to *New York* magazine. A contributing editor to *Vanity Fair* since 1984, she won the Washington Journalism Review Award for Best Magazine Writer in America for her in-depth character portraits of national and world leaders, including both Presidents Bush, Bill and Hillary Clinton, Newt Gingrich, Margaret Thatcher, Saddam Hussein and Mikhail Gorbachev.

Ms. Sheehy is a seven-time recipient of the New York Newswomen's Club Front Page Award for distinguished journalism.



### Thomas R. Frieden, MD, MPH

Dr. Frieden is the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and Administrator of the Agency for Toxic Substances and Disease Registry (ATSDR). A physician with training in internal medicine, infectious diseases, public health, and epidemiology, Dr. Frieden is especially known for his expertise in tuberculosis control. Dr. Frieden has worked to control both communicable and

non-communicable diseases in the United States and around the world.

From 1992–1996, he led New York City's program that rapidly controlled tuberculosis, including reducing cases of multidrug-resistant tuberculosis by 80 percent. He then worked in India for five years where he assisted with national tuberculosis control efforts. The program in India has treated more than 10 million patients and has saved more than one million lives. As Commissioner of the New York City Health Department from 2002–2009, he directed one of the world's largest public health agencies, with an annual budget of \$1.7 billion and more than 6,000 staff.



### Dr. Reed V. Tuckson, MD

Dr. Tuckson is one of our nation's most thoughtful and compelling advocates for health. He is a former Commissioner of Public Health for the District of Columbia and Senior Vice President for Programs at the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation. He went on to serve in a variety of national roles, including President of the Charles R. Drew University of Medicine and Science in Los Angeles and Senior Vice

President, Professional Standards, for the American Medical Association (AMA). He currently serves as Executive Vice President and Chief of Medical Affairs at UnitedHealth Group, a Fortune 25 diversified health and well-being company. As the senior clinician of UnitedHealth Group, Dr. Tuckson is responsible for working with the company's diverse and comprehensive business units to improve the quality and efficiency of the health services they provide to the 75 million members they are privileged to serve worldwide.

**Incarceration, Justice and Health**



### Angela Y. Davis

Through her activism and scholarship over the last decades, Angela Davis has been deeply involved in our nation's

quest for social justice. Her work as an educator—both at the university level and in the larger public sphere—has always emphasized the importance of building communities of struggle for economic, racial, and gender justice.

Like many other educators, Professor Davis is especially concerned with the general tendency to devote more resources and attention to the prison system than to educational institutions. Having helped to popularize the notion of a "prison industrial complex," she now urges her audiences to think seriously about the future possibility of a world without prisons and to help forge a 21st century abolitionist movement.

Angela Davis is the author of eight books and has lectured throughout the United States as well as abroad. In recent years a persistent theme of her work has been the range of social problems associated with incarceration and the generalized criminalization of those communities that are most affected by poverty and racial discrimination. She draws upon her own experiences in the early seventies as a person who spent eighteen months in jail and on trial, after being placed on the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted List." Her most recent books are *Abolition Democracy* and *Are Prisons Obsolete?* about the abolition of the prison industrial complex, and a new edition of *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass*.

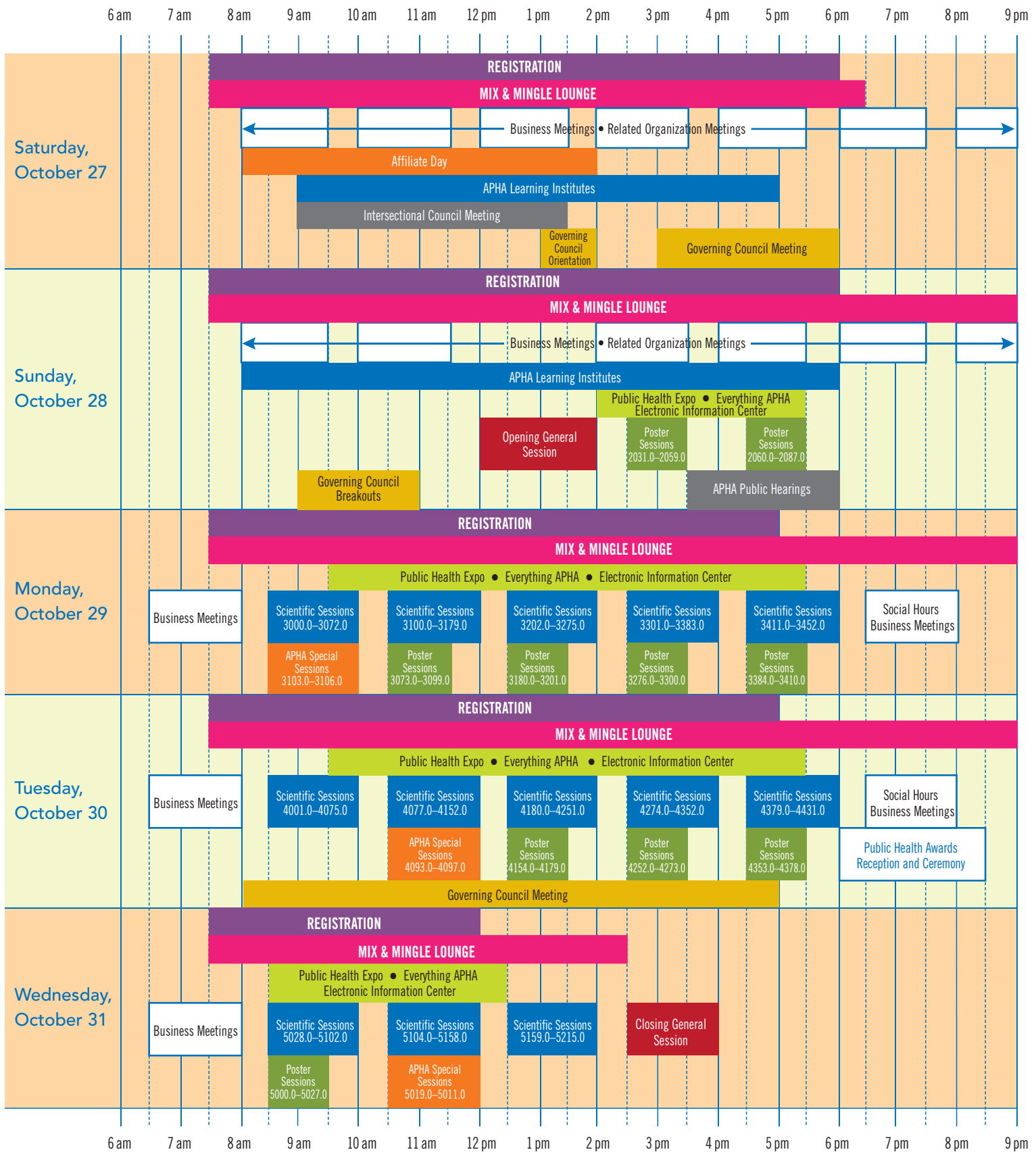

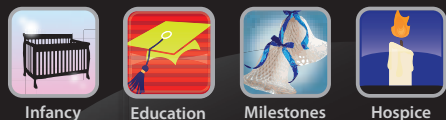
