History of the Teague-Otto House

The one and a half acre tract of land* where the Teague-Otto House is now located was sold by Kinch Hillyer and his wife to G. W. Holloway in a deed dated June 14, 1907.¹ On September 29, 1908 G. W. Holloway conveyed all interest to his wife, Laura Holloway.² On February 23, 1910, Laura Holloway, who was by now a feme sole conveyed this tract to N. P. Teague.³ On December 4, 1925 Claire Teague Dudley conveyed to J. H. Waddell by deed.⁵ The title to the property remained in the Waddell family. When Jacob Henry Waddell died December 9, 1942, his will left a life estate to Lillian Tula Waddell with remainder to the Waddell children. On October 3, 1967, Tula Waddell died leaving her interest to the Waddell children.

Subsequent to the death of Tula, the Waddell children conveyed said tract to Lloyd and Betty Ellison on February 17, 1968.⁶ Since that date there has been only one other sale occurring, November 23, 1977, and being from Lloyd and Betty Ellison to Otto Properties, Inc.

Norman Teague finished the construction of his home at 1810 Avenue M in the summer of 1910.⁴ It is one of the oldest homes in Rosenberg. Rosenberg was incorporated in 1902.¹⁰

"During the period from about 1908 to 1911 several fine two story homes were built on the 'south side' close to where Third Street dead-ended at Avenue M (the "silk stocking row" of that day), and were occupied by the families of Dr. J. S. Yates, Kinch Hillyer, his widowed sister, Mrs Maude Ellison, N. P. Teague,¹¹ Taylor Ray, Earl Trone, Henry A. Meyers and others."

The home was built in ~~Texas colonial~~ style with the exterior of cypress clapboard siding. It was built with a very typical floorplan for the time with a central hallway and four rooms upstairs and ^{four} downstairs. Downstairs there ^{were} ~~was~~ the parlor, living room, dining room and kitchen. Upstairs there were the four bedrooms with the bathroom at the end of the hall. The original bathroom has a claw and ball bathtub. The dining room has a beautifully carved walnut fireplace with a beveled oval mirror. Two huge eight-foot doors separate the dining room from the parlor. The Victorian staircase and hardwood floors are of pine. Originally the house had a screened-in back porch with criss-cross lattice work but ^{this} ~~it~~ was closed in during the time the Waddells owned it.

The front exterior of the house has two fluted ionic pillars extending to the upstairs porch roof. Originally there was a one story porch extending across the expanse of the front with four pillars but during the years the Waddells owned it the porch rotted and was torn down. The Waddells also closed in the back porch with windows.⁸

When Lloyd Ellison purchased the home he converted it into a duplex, closing in the stairs, adding a bathroom downstairs in the middle hall and a kitchen upstairs in the front east bedroom. Ellison added metal stairs to the east side for the entrance to the upstairs apartment and black shutters to the front.

In November 1977 McKay Otto began remodeling the home by reopening the staircase and opening the front east room (living

room) with an eight-foot doorway using two old colonial pillars (which came out of a historical home in Corpus Christi). The interior and exterior of the home ^{new} was painted and central air and heat added. The back porch was closed in and Victorian bullseye corner molding was put around the doors and eleven windows. The floors, woodwork, stairs and fireplace were stripped of the old paint. The upstairs courting balcony was replaced. Side light windows were added on each side of the front door and upstairs balcony door to allow more natural light and a more open effect to the entrance. The ~~shut~~ters were replaced with larger ~~shut~~ters, more in porportion to the size of the home. A circle drive was added.

Reproductions of antique Hunter ceiling fans with hand blown globes were used in four rooms to accent the ornate wall paper which was used to decorate the ceilings.

The interior floor plan was changed to accommodate the needs of a real estate office. The living room became the reception room. The kitchen, back porch and dining room became desk-work areas for seven real estate agents. The parlor became the conference room and is appointed with Victorian furniture.

The home at 1810 Avenue M was built ^{in 1910} by Norman Teague. The original architects and contractors are unknown but the Fort Bend County Sesquicentennial 1822-1972 states that "most of these homes were constructed by several Indiana craftsmen

who had just come to Rosenberg, bringing with them some "revolutionary" methods of building. These homes were said to be of a sturdy "Balloon construction" of dove-tail lath (of heart-of-pine) and plaster, built to withstand the winds of hurricanes."¹¹

Norman P. Teague ^{was} ~~is~~ a direct descendant of Vandever Swearingen Teague, Sr. (1740-1810) who assisted in establishing American Independence, while acting in the capacity of corporal militia Chatham Co., North Carolina. His services during the Revolutionary War were as follows: Chatham Co., North Carolina Militia, Captain Jeduthan Harper's Company - from Militia Rosters, Chatham Co.⁷

Norman Pascal Teague, Sr. was born October 6, 1879, ~~at~~ ⁱⁿ Hill Co., Texas and died February 19, 1913. His wife Sidney Claire Brooks was born June 23, 1879, in Plum, Texas, and died November 5, 1952.

Norman P. Teague and his wife Sidney Claire had both been raised near Corsicana.⁴ Norman Teague had completed business school in Galveston and Sidney Claire had just graduated from Ball High School (her family had moved to Galveston) when they met. They returned to Corsicana to be married. They decided to move to Rosenberg in 1902 because Teague felt it was a "little city with a big future."

They lived in the Hitch home on Main Street (Third Street) when they first came to Rosenberg and Teague had a grocery store.

The family moved to a second residence (the Tinsleys house) before they purchased their land and built their home at 1810 Avenue M. During this time Norman Teague founded N. P. Teague's Rosenberg Mill and Elevator Company¹²; and had a grain elevator and bought and sold cotton.

Norman Teague and his wife Sidney Claire finished their home in the Summer of 1910. They built the large two-story ~~colony~~^{colonial} home because they felt they would have many children and ~~would~~ need the room. Sidney Claire was pregnant at the time they moved in and Sidney, their youngest child was born October 10, 1910. They had four children: Helen (McGaren), Norman Teague, Jr., Lulu (McDonald), and Sidney (Davis).⁴ The Teagues were best friends with the Taylor Ray family who lived down the street.⁹

Norman Teague died in 1913; he was only 32 years old. Sidney Claire and the Teague children lived in their home until 1921.⁴ Sidney Claire in the meantime married Walter Dudley, a traveling Baptist preacher from Alabama. The family moved to Alabama.

On December 4, 1925, the home was sold to Jake H. Waddell.⁵ (Waddell: January 20, 1868 - December 9, 1942 ¹³) Waddell was a farmer in Rosenberg and worked for the County Tax Assessor.⁸ The Waddells had four adopted children. Jake Waddell was superintendent of the Sunday School at the Methodist Church in Rosenberg.

When the home was sold to Lloyd and Betty Ellison on February 17, 1968, it was in need of repairs. Lloyd Ellison was

a banker in Rosenberg until 1977 and now lives in Dallas.

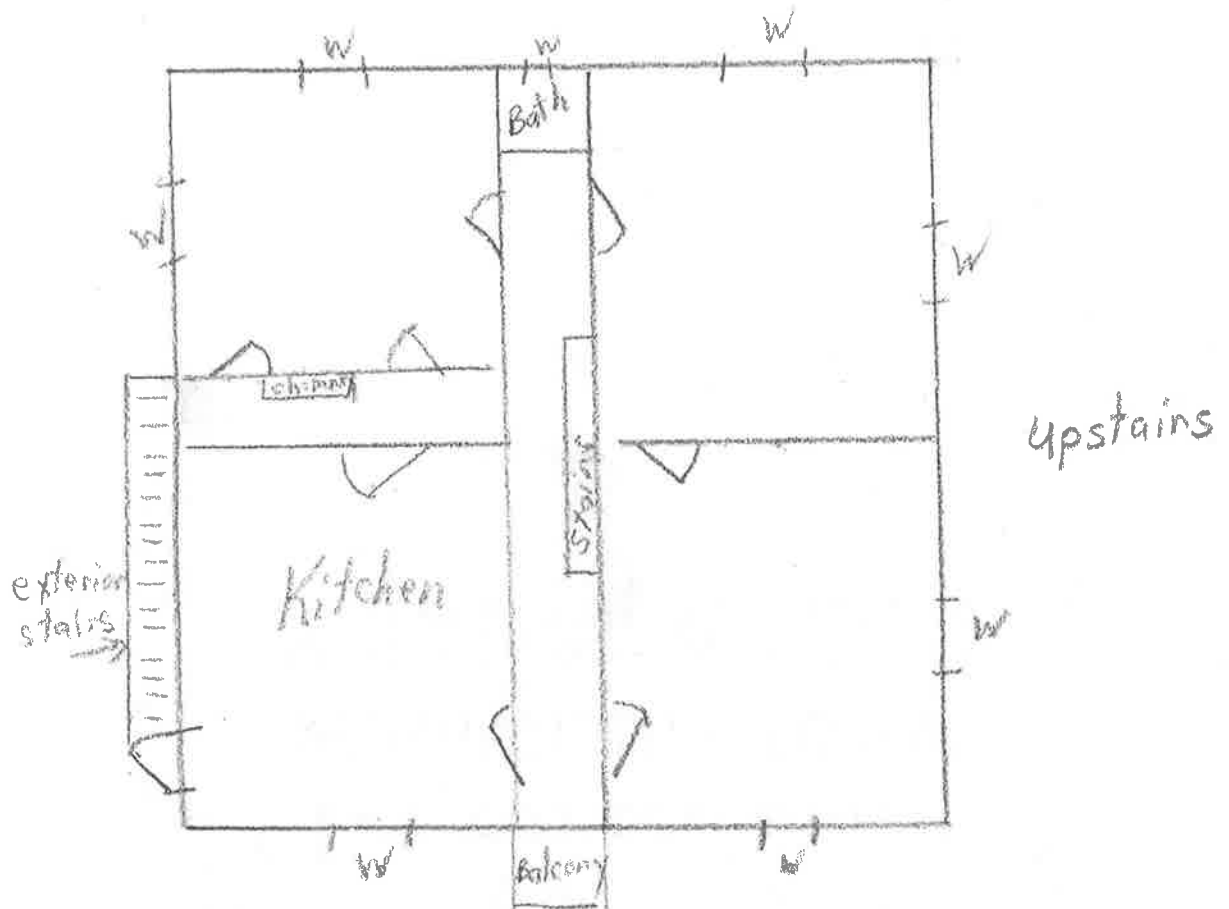
The home was built to meet the needs of the Teague family in the community at the turn of the century. The woods used were the most ^{readily} available at the time, coming from the Schuech lumber mill. The house was typical of ^{Classical Revival} ~~Texas colonial~~ architecture. The house was built for air circulation as was the custom at the time. The eleven-foot ceilings were advantageous for a cooler house and almost every door in the house is equipped with a transom above it. The floor plan is a typical one for the period with a central hall both downstairs and up stairs. The street which the house was built on was referred to as "silk stocking row", and the first sidewalk in the town was built in front of the house.

The structure at 1810 Avenue M was used for a primary residence of its owners (except for the Resingers renting it from Mrs. Teague from 1921 until December 4, 1925, when it was sold to the Waddels) until the early 1970's when the Ellisons converted it into two apartments. On November 23, 1977, Otto Properties, Inc. purchased the home at 1810 Avenue M and remodeling was begun. The downstairs of the home was remodeled to be used as a real estate office for McKay Otto, Realtors and the upstairs will be converted into an antique shop or office spaces.

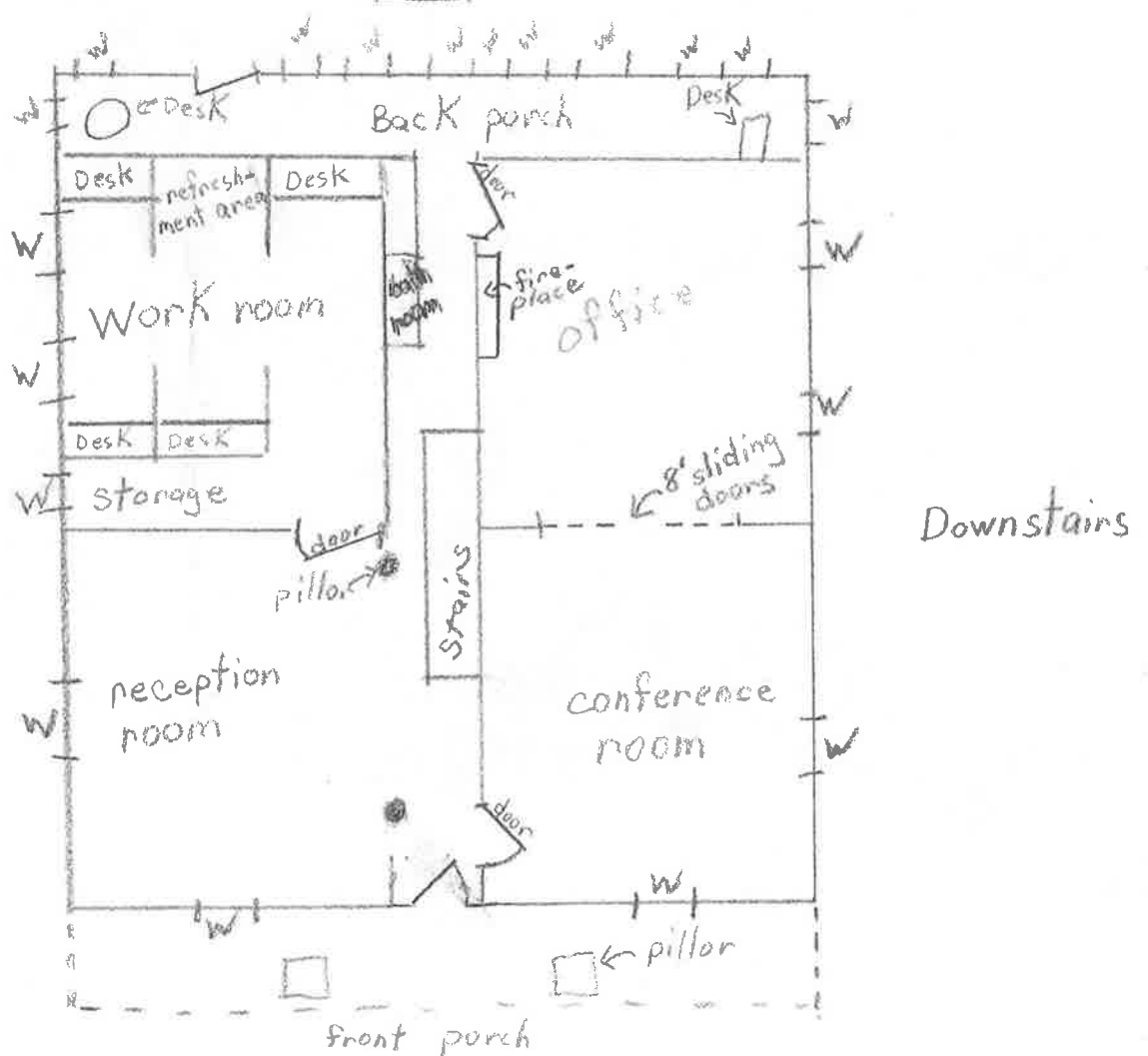
The home is currently in excellent condition. The present owner, Otto Properties, Inc. is responsible for the upkeep. The downstairs of the house is currently the offices of McKay Otto, Realtors. In the next several years it is hoped to ^{install upstairs} ~~put~~ an antique shop ~~upstairs~~ or office spaces.

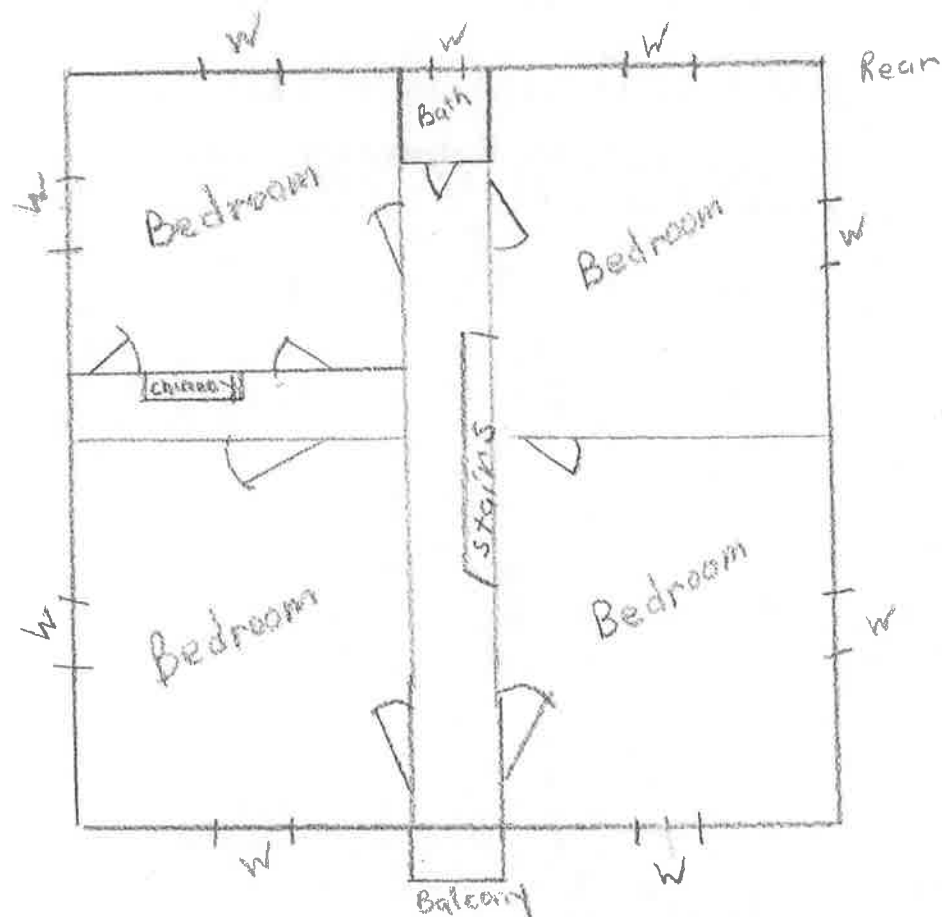

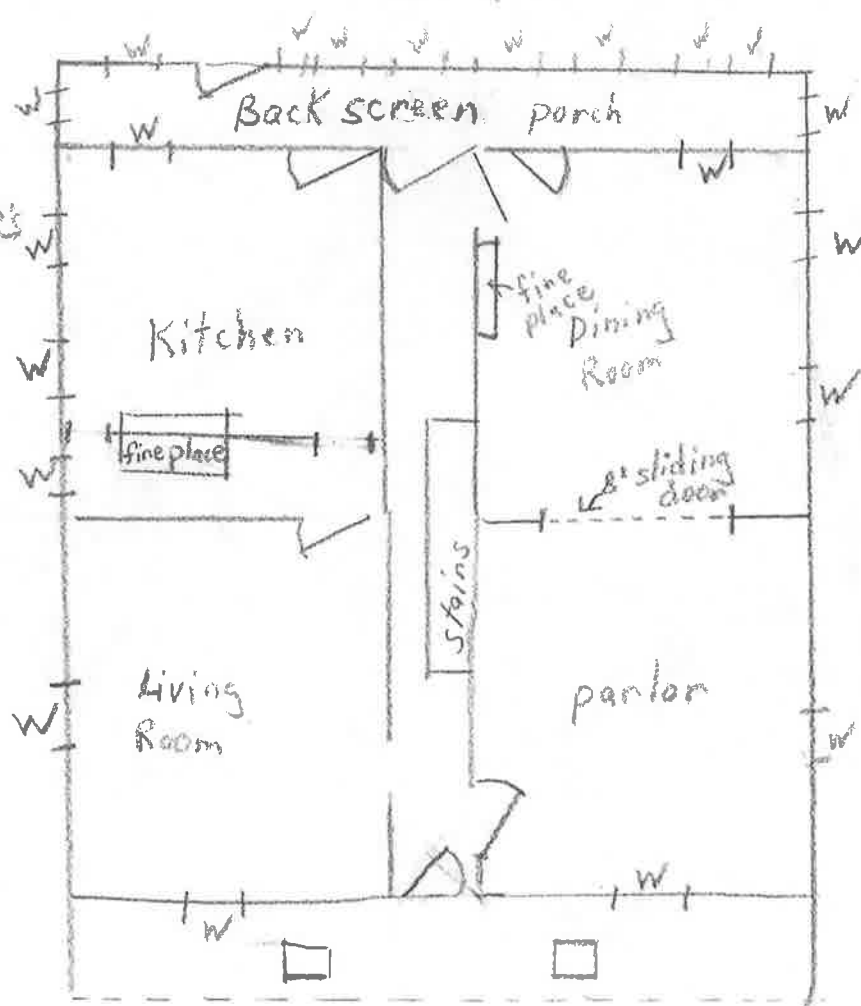

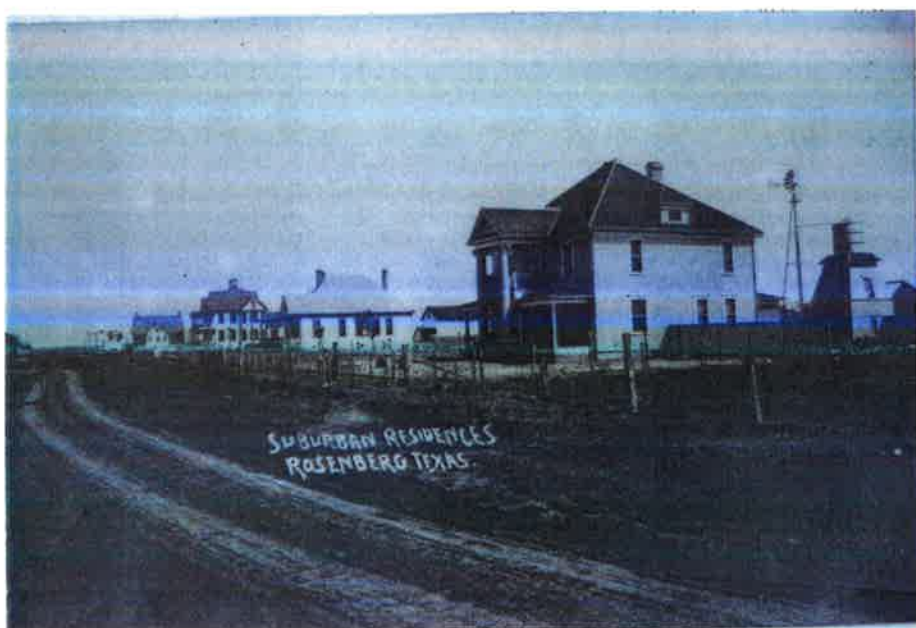

COMPLIANCE REQUEST, re TEAGUE-WADDELL HOUSE, 1810 Avenue M,
Rosenberg

The correct historical designation for the structure at 1810 Avenue M, Rosenberg, is "The Teague-Waddell House", for the original occupant-builder and for the longest-term occupants. Rules of the Texas Historical Commission forbid mention of a current owner unless that owner has been in possession for at least 25 years of the historically-marked house.

A missing part of the documentation for this house needs to be filed with the dossier. This missing documentation is a list of the ownerships of the house site from the time the land came out of public domain down to the year 1907.

Very likely this land was alienated from public domain in a large survey of some sort -- say 4,000 to 640 acres. Please refer to your abstract of title or the office of the county clerk and determine all of the chain of title from the original alienation down to 1907, giving the name of the grantor and grantee, date of the sale, consideration, etc. Deeds of trust and other liens need not be included, since there are other evidences of the date of the construction of the house under consideration.

The history of this house is very interesting indeed. The builder and his family have an attractive profile as given in the history. The Waddell family preserved the structure as their home for 43 years. The house has evidently loomed rather large in the community, as one of the earliest residences of some impressive worth and dignity. It therefore deserves to have its history preserved with the very best documentation.

Architectural Evaluation:

The alterations such as the entrances and balcony, the removal of the lower porch, have sufficiently* changed the original design. Even though certain details -- e. g., the pediment ornamentation -- still exist, I cannot recommend. J. R. W., 2/15/79

Substantive Evaluation: The property merits a small subject marker, for it once stood in a rural setting, whereas now it is in a part of the town which is considered close in and old. It merits a subject marker because of the preservation of this relic of the cultural history of the town, even though the "restoration" is bad. Joe Williams may have meant at the asterisk* that the changes have significantly altered the original design. Sometimes I have difficulty reading his script. The fault is mine, I suppose. Anyway the house is important to cultural history.

Administrative Evaluation:

I must disagree with the other staff members. We judge on age, historical importance and architecture. This is one of the oldest houses in Rosenberg. It was owned by one of the founders of the community.. It is an excellent example of adaptive re-use of a historical structure. The alterations seem minimal to me. Certainly not enough to deny the Medallion and plate- the Recorded Texas Historic Landmark.

I recommend Medallion and plate. - *Annice Blead*

Once Was In Rosenberg's 'Silk Stocking'

Teague-Waddell House Receives H

Rosenberg's reputation as a city with a rich history has received a boost -- the second historical marker on a Rosenberg house soon will be erected.

The tall, white "Teague-Waddell House" at 1810 Avenue M will bear the prestigious plaque. Years ago, Avenue M near Third Street was known as "Silk Stocking Row." Elegant two-story homes were built in that area by Dr. J.S. Yates, Kinch Hillyer, N.P. Teague, Taylor Ray,

Earl Trone and Henry A. Meyers.

The Teague-Waddell House was remodeled in 1977 by McKay and Joan Otto and now is used as his real estate office.

"The Teague-Waddell home is an excellent example of Texas Colonial architecture of the early 1900s. In order to preserve the homes of this period it is necessary to establish them as historically important," Otto said.

"Rosenberg has been a town that has paid little attention to its history and heritage. The Teague-Waddell home is the only home like it in Rosenberg and bringing awareness to its historical significance will help preserve the history of Rosenberg."

The first historical marker was posted this spring on the Trone-Ray-Lane home on Third Street, now occupied by Rosenberg councilman Milton Lane and

his wife, Myrtis. A marker, granted by the Texas Historical Commission, requires research on the original owners.

The Lanes had hoped their marker would spark interest in preserving the city's history. Neighboring Richmond already has several home and site markers.

Norman P. Teague, builder of the house, moved to the city in 1902 because he felt it was a "little city with a big

future." He was a businessman who founded N.P. Teague's Mill and Elevator Co. He died in 1913 in his early 30s.

Two of his daughters who lived in the home are now living in Richmond -- Sidney Davis and Helen McGaren. The home was sold to Jake H. Waddell in 1925; his family lived there for more than 40 years.

Later, the home was turned into a rental duplex. One of the first remodeling

projects was reopening the Victorian staircase. Other original features restored include an antique claw-and-ball-footed bath tub, two 8-foot doors, a carved walnut fireplace with an oval mirror, transoms above the doors and pine floors.

The living room opens through the 8-foot doorway flanked by two old colonial pillars taken from a historical home in Corpus Christi.
