


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INTRODUCTION

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 is the federal law that protects individuals and groups from discrimination on the basis of race, color, and national origin in programs and activities that receive federal financial assistance. Title VI established a standard that outlawed discrimination in the conduct of all federal activities. Another concern was that high and adverse environmental impacts of private or governmental actions might fall disproportionately on populations protected by Title VI. With this concern in mind, Executive Order 12898 was issued in 1994 to establish requirements for *environmental justice* to ensure that everyone within the U.S. receives equal protection under the law. Executive Order 12898 directed each federal agency to review its procedures and to make environmental justice part of its mission by identifying and addressing the effect of all programs, policies, and activities on minority populations.

All programs and activities of entities that receive federal financial assistance must also comply with Executive Order 13166 "Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency." All recipients of federal funds must take reasonable steps to ensure that limited English proficient (LEP) persons have meaningful access to its programs, services, and information provided. Persons who do not speak English as their primary language and have a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English may be considered LEP.

The U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT) issued Title VI Regulations (49 CFR part 21) to ensure that no person is excluded from or denied the benefits of, or otherwise subjected to discrimination, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance from the DOT. The Federal Transit Administration (FTA) is an agency within the DOT that provides financial and technical assistance to state and local public transit systems. FTA Circular 4702.1B provides recipients of FTA financial assistance with guidance and instructions necessary to carry out the DOT Title VI Regulations and to integrate into their programs and activities principles of environmental justice and access to services for persons with limited English proficiency.

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department is a recipient of federal funds from the FTA and must follow the guidance included in FTA Circular 4702.1B. This report serves two purposes:

- 1) to provide an assessment of current compliance by Fort Bend County with the requirements of Title VI pursuant to FTA Circular 4702.1B; and
- 2) to establish procedures for future Title VI compliance.

This document is organized into six sections following this introduction. The material covered in each section is described as follows:

- Section 1 provides an overview for the guidance and instructions in FTA Circular 4702.1B.
- **Section 2** includes information about the population demographics for Fort Bend County and highlights the transit services and programs sponsored by the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department.

- Section 3 looks more specifically at what languages other than English are spoken at home by Fort Bend County residents and gauges the extent to which these populations access transit services.
- Section 4 presents a statement of policy for compliance with Title VI, instructions for how a member of the public may file a discrimination complaint, and procedures for tracking and investigating Title VI complaints.
- **Section 5** documents the types of public information about transit services currently provided by the Public Transportation Department and summarizes public outreach and involvement activities. The LEP Plan is included in Section 5.
- **Section 6** provides system-wide service standards and policies in compliance with the FTA Circular 4702.1B program-specific guidance for recipients that provide transit service in a large urban area.

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SECTION 1. FTA GUIDANCE AND INSTRUCTIONS

The purpose of this section is to provide an overview for the guidance and instructions in FTA Circular 4702.1B. The circular applies to all recipients of FTA financial assistance. Compliance with the guidance and instructions is addressed in Sections 3 through 7 of this document.

OBJECTIVES

Consistent with DOT Title VI Regulations and the principles of environmental justice and access to services for persons with limited English proficiency, the FTA Circular 4702.1B sets forth the following objectives:

- Ensure that the level and quality of transportation service is provided without regard to race, color, or national origin;
- Identify and address, as appropriate, disproportionately high and adverse human health and
 environmental effects, including social and economic effects of programs and activities on
 minority populations and low-income populations;
- Promote the full and fair participation of all affected populations in transportation decision making;
- Prevent the denial, reduction, or delay in benefits related to programs and activities that benefit minority populations or low-income populations; and
- Ensure meaningful access to programs and activities by persons with limited English proficiency.

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department must follow FTA Circular 4702.1B general requirements to ensure that programs, policies, and activities comply with DOT Title VI Regulations. These requirements include:

- Submit an annual Title VI assurance as part of the annual Certification and Assurance to FTA;
- Notify beneficiaries of protection under Title VI;
- Develop Title VI complaint procedures for investigating and tracking Title VI complaints and make procedures for filing a complaint available to members of the public;
- Prepare and maintain a list of any active Title VI investigations, complaints, and lawsuits conducted by entities other than FTA; and
- Ensure meaningful access to LEP persons by developing and carrying out a language implementation plan.

FTA requires the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department to prepare and submit a Title VI Program to FTA every three years. As described in 49 CFR Part 21, the County's Title VI program is required to include the following information:

Title VI Notice to the Public

- Title VI complaint procedures for investigating and tracking Title VI complaints and make procedures for filing a complaint available to members of the public;
- Title VI Complaint Form
- A list of any active Title VI investigations, complaints, and lawsuits conducted by entities other than FTA; and
- Public Participation Plan,
- Language Assistance Plan for providing language assistance to persons with limited English proficiency (LEP); and
- A table depicting the membership of non-elected committees and councils, the
 membership of which is selected by the recipient, broken down by race, and a
 description of the process the agency uses to encourage the participation of minorities
 on such committees; and
- A description of how the agency monitors its subrecipients for compliance with Title VI, and schedule of subrecipient Title VI Program submissions; and
- A Title VI equity analysis if the recipient has constructed a facility, such as a vehicle storage facility, maintenance facility, operation center, etc.; and
- A copy of board meeting minutes, resolution, or other appropriate documentation showing
 the board of directors or appropriate governing entity or officials responsible for policy
 decisions reviewed and approved the Title VI Program.

REQUIREMENTS FOR CONSTRUCTION PROJECTS

Recipients of Federal Transit Administration financial assistance are required to conduct a Title VI equity analysis during the planning phase of all construction projects (i.e. vehicle storage, operations and maintenance) and during the analysis required by the National Environmental Policy Act analysis. Since Fort Bend County Public Transportation's last Title VI update (November 2020) Fort Bend County Transit has continued with the planning phase for the Westpark Park and Ride facility and has completed construction on the Fort Bend Transit Administration and Operations and Facility. Appendix A represents the project's Advanced Planning Report including Title VI relevant considerations.

National Environmental Protection Act Background

The primary law governing the FTA environmental protection process is the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969 (42 U.S.C. 4321 et seq.), as amended. Many different federal laws, rules, and regulations govern environmental review of federally assisted mass transportation projects. NEPA establishes protection of the environment as a national priority and mandates that environmental impacts must be considered before any federal action likely to significantly affect the environment is undertaken. Other special purpose statutes and procedures may apply as well, depending on specific circumstances, e.g., protective measures for historic properties, wetlands, floodplains, etc. If related environmental review requirements apply, they are to be undertaken as part of the NEPA compliance process.

The process for complying with NEPA and federal surface transportation statutes is defined in the joint Federal Highway Administration/ FTA Environmental Impact and Related Procedures (23 C.F.R 771). The regulation sets forth the agencies' policy of combining all environmental analyses and reviews into a single process. It defines the roles and responsibilities of FTA and its

grant applicants in preparing documents, and in managing the environmental process within the various project development phases.

Applicants intending to apply for federal transit funding should notify FTA at the time a project concept is identified. Once the applicant has furnished sufficient information and documentation, FTA will advise the applicant of the probable class of action and the related level of documentation required in the NEPA process. Recipients and sub-recipients of federal funding for construction projects should integrate an environmental justice analysis into the NEPA documentation. Recipients are not required to conduct environmental justice analyses of projects where NEPA documentation is not required.

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SECTION 2. OVERVIEW OF FORT BEND COUNTY

The purpose of this section is to provide an overview of the population demographics for Fort Bend County and to highlight the transit services provided by the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department.

POPULATION DEMOGRAPHICS IN FORT BEND COUNTY

Fort Bend County is located along the Gulf Coast region of Texas, within the Houston-The Woodlands-Sugar Land metropolitan area, the fifth-largest metropolitan area in the United States with a population of approximately 7.1 million. According to the US Census in 2020, Fort Bend County's population was estimated at 822,779, which represents 11.55 percent of the total population in the metropolitan area.

Population Growth

The population of Fort Bend County has grown significantly since 1990, as shown in Table 1. Since 1990, the County has grown from 225,421 to 822,779 making it one the fastest growing counties in the nation. The Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) further estimates that Fort Bend County's population will continue to grow, adding just over 200,000 people by the year 2030.

Urban and Rural Fort Bend County

Most of the population of Fort Bend County falls within the Houston urbanized area. In 2010, the Fort Bend County population was 585,375 and 547,198 or 93.5 percent was in the urbanized area. The remaining population 38,177 or 6.5 percent was in rural Fort Bend County. According to 2017 ACS estimates, 689,175 residents (96.8 percent) of Fort Bend County reside within the Houston urbanized area.

According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the county has a total area of 861.5 square miles and is the 181st largest county in Texas by total area. The average population density was 679.5 persons per square mile as of the 2010 Census and approximately 826 persons per square mile in 2017, according to the 2017 ACS 5-Year estimates. Rural areas of the county average approximately 65 persons per square mile.

Geographically, large portions of the county are rural; however, cities are growing rapidly.

Diversity

Fort Bend County is one of the most diverse counties in the United States as reflected in racial and ethnic population demographics represented below in Table 2.

Incorporated Cities

Seventeen incorporated cities fall within the boundaries of Fort Bend County. Table 3 identifies the cities and presents the population and growth from 2010 to 2020. The remaining population in Fort Bend County resides in unincorporated areas of the county or in the small segments of the City of Houston that exist within Fort Bend County.

Poverty

Under the federal guidelines for environmental justice, low-income population means a person whose median household income is at or below the poverty guidelines. According to the 2020 census data, 7.4 percent of the total population in Fort Bend County were living below the poverty level. The poverty level in Fort Bend County is below the state of Texas (14.67 percent) and Harris County (15.1 percent).

Older Adults and Persons with a Disability

The focus of federal Title VI regulations is not on demographics of age and disability. However, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department does develop services that are responsive to the needs of older adults (persons age 60 and over) and persons with a disability.

Approximately 17.5 percent of all persons residing in Fort Bend County in 2020 were 60 years of age or older. According to the 2019 ACS 1-Year Estimate, approximately 11.6 percent of Fort Bend County's population is 65 years of age or older. This compares with the senior population for the state of Texas at approximately 11.7 percent and Harris County at approximately 10.9 percent.

According to 2019 ACS 5-Year Estimates, approximately 6.6 percent of civilian, non-

institutionalized persons over the age of five reported a disability.

FORT BEND COUNTY PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION DEPARTMENT

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department is the public transit provider within Fort Bend County. The Public Transportation Department provides three transit services/programs: demand response transit service; commuter transit service; and Ambassador Service.

Demand Response Transit Service. Fort Bend County offers demand response transit services to all citizens of Fort Bend County. Demand response transit service only serves origins/destinations in Fort Bend County. In order to schedule or cancel a ride, a rider may call 866-751-TRIP between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday (excluding Fort Bend County holidays) and ask for the "Fort Bend County Reservations." Reservations can be made 30 days or up to one (1) business day in advance of the appointment time. Rides are scheduled for first destination drop-off by 8:00 a.m. and the last pick-up will be no later than 5:00 p.m. Repeat rides may be scheduled in advance. Rides will be accepted on a "time and space" available basis. Trip fares are \$1.00 per person each way. Passengers must be ready 15 minutes before scheduled pick up time. This is a curb-to-curb service; however, persons with disabilities can request door-to-door service, as well as an Ambassador.

Commuter Transit Service. Fort Bend County operates commuter bus service to three major employment centers in Harris County. The service consists of three bus routes, one to Greenway Plaza, one to Uptown/Galleria, and one to the Texas Medical Center. Park-and-rides are located at the University of Houston Sugar Land campus at University Boulevard and US 59, the AMC Movie Theatre on Town Center Boulevard near First Colony Mall, and the Fort Bend County Fairgrounds near State Highway 36 and Fairgrounds Road. The Greenway Plaza route offers a connection to the Metropolitan Transit Authority (METRO) West Bellfort Park & Ride. At this location, riders are able to transfer to METRO routes to downtown Houston and the TMC. Fort Bend commuter service runs Monday through Friday (excluding Fort Bend County holidays) during peak commuter periods. Buses leave the park and ride lots between 4:30 a.m. and 10:00 a.m. and return from the activity centers between 3:15 p.m. and 8:40 p.m. at 15 to 20 minute intervals. A midday service is also available for our TMC service from 11:05 a.m. through 1:40 p.m. fare varies from \$1.00 to \$3.50 each way depending on the origin and destination.

Ambassador Service. Fort Bend Transit offers Ambassador Service. An Ambassador is an individual who works directly with passengers providing assistance from the passenger's door to the vehicle and from the vehicle to the final destination. This personalized service is to assist with the safe passage for those unable to travel unescorted or alone; those who need additional help with boarding and alighting vehicles, and passengers with agitation, behavioral and cognitive issues. Ambassadors may be assigned to bus stop locations and/or transit vehicles. Ambassadors will not be drivers, will not attach passenger securements (seat belts, wheelchair tie-down, etc.) or operate mechanical lifts or ramps.




Figure 1. Fort Bend County Public Transportation Regional Transit Destination

Figure 1 presents the locations for regional public transportation services from Fort Bend County to destinations in Harris County. The regional destinations include Greenway Plaza,

Uptown/Galleria, the Texas Medical Center, and METRO West Bellfort Park & Ride for Fort Bend Commuter Service.

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SECTION 3. ACCESS TO TRANSIT FOR PERSONS WITH LIMITED ENGLISH PROFICIENCY

In previous statistical analyses of demographic characteristics, Fort Bend County identified the concentrations of population that have limited English proficiency.

The purpose of this section is to look more specifically at what languages other than English are spoken at home by Fort Bend County residents and to gauge the extent to which these populations may access transit services. The analysis will help the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department to develop and carry out a language implementation plan.

LANGUAGE SPOKEN AT HOME

To determine the current language/translation needs of the Fort Bend County population at the countywide level, 2020 Census data is used. This data is reported by census tract as households in which a language other than English is spoken at home. A benefit of looking at languages spoken at home is to identify the languages that are most familiar to a person whose nation of origin is not the United States. This information will serve as guidance for Fort Bend County to provide language assistance for growing segments of the population.

The 2020 Census data documents 13 language categories at the household level to present data on the number of households that speak a language and the number of those households that identify as a limited English speaking household. Table 4 presents each language category and the number of households identified for each. As shown in Table 4, Spanish is the language spoken at home by the largest percent of households—nearly 19 percent—after English.

Limited English Proficiency

Of the language categories identified in Table 4, nine categories include households that identify as limited English speaking households at a rate greater than one percent of the total households in that category, as presented in Table 5.

To further investigate Fort Bend County's limited English population, data at the census tract or block group level is required. However, these data sets include only four household language categories for households with limited English—Spanish, Other Indo-European languages, Asian and Pacific Island languages, and Other languages. Appendix C represents this data for each census tract in Fort Bend County.

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SECTION 4. TITLE VI POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

According to the guidance provided by FTA Circular 4702.1B, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department must ensure that programs, policies, and activities comply with DOT Title VI Regulations.

The purpose of this section is to present a statement of policy for compliance with Title VI, instructions for how a member of the public may file a discrimination complaint, and procedures for tracking and investigating Title VI complaints. The Public Transportation Department has a responsibility to provide public notice to the beneficiaries of its public transportation services of protection under Title VI.

TITLE VI STATEMENT OF POLICY FOR PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Fort Bend County is committed to a policy of non-discrimination in the conduct of its business, including the Title VI responsibility to deliver equitable and accessible transportation services. Fort Bend County officially formed the Public Transportation Department in June 2005 to provide residents with safe and efficient public transportation services while maintaining service quality and customer satisfaction.

The Public Transportation Department recognizes its responsibility to the Fort Bend County community in which it operates and to the society it serves. The Public Transportation Department will utilize its best efforts to assure that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under the Fort Bend County program of transit service delivery and related benefits. Further, the Public Transportation Department will utilize best efforts to provide equitable and accessible public transportation services to persons of low income and persons with limited English proficiency.

In order to comply with the Title VI requirements, the Public Transportation Department strives to accomplish the following objectives:

- Ensure that the level and quality of transportation service is provided without regard to race, color or national origin;
- Identify and address, as appropriate, disproportionately high and adverse human health and environmental effects, including social and economic effects of programs and activities on minority populations and low-income populations;
- Promote the full and fair participation of all affected populations in transportation decision making;
- Prevent the denial, reduction or delay in benefits related to programs and activities that benefit minority populations or low-income populations; and
- Ensure meaningful access to programs and activities by persons with limited English proficiency.

The responsibility for carrying out Fort Bend County's commitment to Title VI responsibilities rests with the Director of the Public Transportation Department. All managers, supervisors, and

employees in the Public Transportation Department share in the responsibility for making the Title VI Program a success.

Fort Bend County is committed to safeguarding against discrimination in its provision of public transportation services. Any person who feels he or she may have been discriminated against is encouraged to report in writing such a violation to the Fort Bend County within 180 days of the alleged discrimination. Additional information concerning the Fort Bend County Title VI obligations and the complaint procedure can be found by calling (281) 633-7433 or on the county's website www.FBCTransit.org.

FILING A DISCRIMINATION COMPLAINT

The responsibility for carrying out Fort Bend County's commitment to Title VI responsibilities rests with the Director of the Public Transportation Department. All managers, supervisors, and employees in the Public Transportation Department share in the responsibility for making the Title VI Program a success.

Any person who feels he or she may have been discriminated against is encouraged to report in writing such a violation to the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department within 180 days of the alleged discrimination. If the individual believes that he/she has been excluded from participation in, denied the benefits of, or subjected to discrimination based on race, color, or national origin under Fort Bend County's Public Transportation Department programs for transit service delivery or related benefits, the individual may file a complaint with the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department:

Appendix D of this report provides a copy of the complaint form. Comments can be submitted in a format other than the complaint form. If the complaint is filed verbally, the information will be documented in writing by the Public Transportation Department.

TRACKING AND INVESTIGATING TITLE VI COMPLAINTS

The Civil Rights Officer will review and investigate every complaint promptly. Reasonable measures will be undertaken to preserve any information that is confidential. At a minimum, the Civil Rights Officer will:

- Identify and review all relevant documents, practices and procedures; and
- Identify and interview persons with knowledge of the Title VI violation, i.e., the person making the complaint; witnesses or anyone identified by the Complainant; anyone who may have been subject to similar activity, or anyone with relevant information.

Once the investigation has been completed, the Civil Rights Officer will decide the validity of the complaint and what, if any, remedial actions will be taken to address the complainant's concerns. If a Title VI violation is found to exist, remedial steps as appropriate and necessary will be taken immediately. The complainant will also receive a final report together with any remedial steps. The investigation process and final report should take no longer than twenty-five (25) business days. If no violation is found and the complainant wishes to appeal the decision, he or she may appeal directly to the Director of Public Transportation, 301 Jackson Street, Richmond, Texas 77469.

The Civil Rights Officer will maintain a log of Title VI complaints received from this process which shall include the date the complaint was filed; a summary of the allegations; the status of the complaint; and actions taken by the Department of Public Transportation in response to the complaint. Should Fort Bend County receive a Title VI complaint in the form of a formal charge or lawsuit, the complaint will be forwarded to the Fort Bend County Attorney, The Civil Rights Officer's log of Title VI complaints will be included in each Title VI program update. If no complaints were received, a letter stating this fact will be included in place of the complaint log. See Appendix E for Fort Bend County's 2021 Letter of No Title VI Complaints.

The Civil Rights Officer will prepare and maintain a list of any active Title VI investigations, complaints, and lawsuits conducted by entities other than FTA.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department is responsible for notifying the public and beneficiaries of public transportation services of protection under Title VI and providing instructions on how to file a discrimination complaint.

To notify the public and beneficiaries of public transportation services of protection under Title VI, the Public Transportation Department will do the following:

- Post the Title VI policy statement, instructions on how to file a complaint, and access to the complaint form on the departmental website.
- Post the Title VI policy statement and instructions on how to file a complaint in the office of the Public Transportation Department.
- Post the Title VI policy statement and instructions on how to file a complaint in all buses of the Public Transportation Department.
- Include information in the Fort Bend County Public Transportation's Title VI Notice on how to contact the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Civil Rights Officer to request additional information regarding the Title VI Program or to file a complaint.

All vital documents will be provided in the languages identified by FBC's Four Factor Analysis as languages spoken by at least one percent of the County's population. See Appendix J for Fort Bend County Public Transportation's Public Notice.

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SECTION 5. PUBLIC INFORMATION ABOUT TRANSIT SERVICES AND LAPPLAN

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department is committed to ensuring meaningful access to programs and activities by persons with limited English proficiency, as required by FTA Circular 4702.1B.

This section has two purposes. The first purpose is to document the types of public information about transit services currently provided by the Public Transportation Department and to summarize public outreach and involvement activities to reach out to target markets including minority and low-income people, older adults, and persons with disabilities. The second purpose is to document a proposed approach to ensure meaningful access to persons with limited English proficiency by providing more bilingual information.

SUMMARY OF CURRENT PUBLIC OUTREACH AND INVOLVEMENT

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department provides public outreach pamphlets in both English and Spanish. The Public Transportation Department also provides public information about all transit services in English via the following media.

Individuals with hearing impairments can make a reservation utilizing the Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS). The individual would dial 711 which would connect him/her to TRS. Individuals with vision impairments may request printed materials in larger fonts upon request.

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department engages in public outreach in order to attract ridership and inform others of transit services. Outreach takes the form of presentations, open houses, information tables, group discussions, posters, and pamphlets. Public involvement activities occur at churches, schools, community centers, governmental agencies, chambers of commerce, and agencies that provide human and social services for older adults and persons with disabilities. The Public Transportation Department keeps a record of the locations and events. The language used for all verbal presentations and group discussions is English; however professional interpreters are available for all presentations and events upon request. Sign language interpreters are available upon request.

Appendix F includes documentation of public presentations and public outreach initiatives by the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department. Many of the collaboration meetings are with advocates for minority and low-income people – for example:

Public outreach also includes a concerted effort to reach out to health and human service agencies that support persons with disabilities and older adults.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION PLAN

The Public Participation Plan (PPP) is a guide for FBCPT's ongoing public participation activities. The purpose of this PPP is to provide guidance when seeking public input related to projects and service changes and to identify techniques and methodologies for soliciting and considering public input.

The PPP aims to offer early and continuous opportunities for the public to be involved in the decision-making process and to consider the identification of social, economic, and environmental impacts of proposed transportation decisions. It is intended as a guide on how FBCPT will sustain its efforts to engage community members throughout the service area. As established with our Title VI policy, this includes seeking out and considering the viewpoints of minority, low-income, and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) populations as well as older adults and persons with limited mobility in the course of conducting outreach activities. Appendix I includes the PPP and provides specific strategies used to engage minority populations when engaging the public.

ENHANCEMENTS FOR PUBLIC OUTREACH TO TITLE VI POPULATIONS

In order to ensure that minority, low-income, and LEP persons have meaningful access to public outreach activities, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will enhance the current public involvement program in the following ways:

- All public outreach efforts will continue to be descriptively documented and the following information about each outreach effort will be noted:
 - o Date of the outreach:
 - o Name, address, and phone number of location of the public outreach;
 - o Names of Fort Bend County Public Transportation staff that were present;
 - o Name of partner staff that were present;
 - Notes about the outreach effort describing the reason for the outreach and the format of the outreach (presentation, open house, information table, group discussion, meeting, or other);
 - o Number of individuals in attendance.

• The Public Transportation Department has developed a Language Assistance Plan to ensure meaningful access to LEP persons (see LAP Plan below).

FOUR FACTOR ANALYSIS

In developing the language implementation plan, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department undertook a U.S. DOT "four factor" LEP analysis. A brief description of each factor and pertinent considerations are provided in the following discussion.

1. The number or proportion of LEP persons eligible in the Fort Bend County service area who may be served or likely to encounter a Public Transportation Department program, activity, or service.

As documented in Section 3 of this report, Spanish is the language other than English most often used by residents of Fort Bend County. Nearly 19 percent of the Fort Bend County households speaks Spanish at home. There are eight other languages or language categories spoken at home by at least one percent of Fort Bend County's households, including: Other Indo-European languages (11.26 percent), Chinese including Mandarin and Cantonese (29.31 percent), German or other West Germanic languages (25.51 percent), Other Asian and Pacific Island languages (16.60 percent), Vietnamese (17.50 percent), Russian, Polish, or other Slavic languages (14.15 percent), Tagalog including Filipino (5.75 percent), and Arabic (13.53 percent).

2. The frequency with which LEP individuals come in contact with a Public Transportation Department program, activity, or service.

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department assesses the frequency with which staff and drivers have or could possibly have contact with LEP persons. This includes documenting phone inquiries and verbally surveying drivers. The occasions when information is requested in another language are infrequent; however, when a request is made, the request is for information in Spanish.

3. The nature and importance of the program, activity, or service provided by the Public Transportation Department.

Public transportation is the means of travel to work, getting to medical appointments or to attend school and achieve general mobility for many LEP persons. The Public Transportation Department partners with numerous community organizations and social and human service agencies to provide transit services. The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will collaborate with all organizations and agencies in the service area to seek public input, hold public meetings, and assist in advising all LEP persons of the types of language assistance and public transportation services that can be provided.

4. The resources available to the Public Transportation Department and overall costs.

The Public Transportation Department continuously assesses its available resources that could be used for providing LEP assistance. This includes determining the ability of members of the staff and drivers to speak another language (specifically, Spanish), having a contractor in place if/when a professional interpreter and/or translation services are needed, which documents would be most valuable to be translated if and when warranted, taking an inventory of available organizations that the Public Transportation Department could partner with for outreach and translation efforts, and what level of staff training is needed.

Based on these four factors, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department developed a plan to assist LEP persons who speak Spanish as a native language.

LANGUAGE ASSISTANCE PLAN (LAP)

Consistent with guidance provided by FTA Circular 4702.1B, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will provide language assistance for persons with limited English proficiency. It is the policy of Fort Bend Transit to provide a timely meaningful access to all persons with LEP (Limited English Proficiency) free of charge.

In addition, the department will monitor available information to anticipate the need for languages other than English that have been identified during the four-factor analysis.

Language Assistance Measures

In order to ensure meaningful access to LEP persons who have limited English proficiency, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will enhance current public information about transit services in the following ways:

- The Title VI statement of policy and instructions for how to file a discrimination complaint. The complaint form will be provided in all languages that fall under the Safe Harbor Provision.
- Public information materials will be provided with an option for languages other than English.
 - o Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department's website will have all vital documents posted in English and the ability to view in multiple languages including the languages identified under the Safe Harbor threshold. These vital documents are also available in print if requested.
 - The recorded information for the telephone number for general information will have a bilingual option in Spanish;
- When an interpreter is needed to respond to a telephone call to reserve a demand response transit trip, the person will be referred to a bilingual Public Transportation Department employee when available. If a bilingual employee is not available in the language requested, FBT will provide over the phone interpretation services through the

County's contracted translation vendor to assist the customer. The individual's reserved trip will be noted with their preferred language and on the driver's manifest to alert the driver to a LEP passenger who may need additional assistance.

- A member of the Fort Bend County staff who speaks Spanish or a contracted interpreter will be available to facilitate public outreach efforts involving the general public in areas of the county where there are concentrations of LEP population (to be determined based on census data or other reliable sources of information).
- The Public Transportation Department will make available an interpreter for public meetings. The announcement for the public meeting will state that translation services will be provided if requested in advance.

Monitor Trends in Languages Other than English

The Fort Bend Public Transportation Department will use the following tools to identify who may need language assistance:

- Examine records for language assistance from past meetings and events to anticipate the possible need for assistance at upcoming meetings.
- When the Public Transportation Department sponsors workshops or conferences, the responsible staff member will set up a sign-in sheet and then assign someone to personally greet and briefly speak to each attendee. To informally gage the attendee's ability to speak and understand English, the greeter will ask a question that requires a full sentence reply.
- Require FBT Reservation staff and Receptionist document each time a call is received from a person who does not speak proficiently in English. Keep a log and review on a quarterly basis to establish a trend line.
- Examine the latest Census data.

Safe Harbor Provision

DOJ's Safe Harbor Provision outlines the circumstances that can provide transit agencies a "safe harbor" regarding the translation of written materials for LEP populations. It stipulates that if a recipient provides written translation of vital documents for each eligible language group that constitutes five percent (5%) of its population of persons, or 1,000 persons whichever is less.

Fort Bend County Public Transportation has identified the following as vital documents including:

- Title VI Notice/Policy
- Service/Route Schedules
- Passenger Guidelines
- Public Participation Plan
- ADA & Title VI Complaint From and Procedures

Vital documents will be translated in the languages that meet the Limited English Proficient (LEP) Safe Harbor threshold and will be available to the public. For requests for translations in a language not identified under the Safe Harbor threshold, the public is encouraged to contact the Transit Office during normal business hours and allow three (3) to five (5) days to process the request.

These vital documents can be found on the department website and have been converted to text based website content. Users may access the converted content on the Fort Bend County Public Transportation website. Software is available on the website to natively translate the converted documents making it accessible and useable globally. This feature is accessible via the top right dropdown menu option "Select Language". There are more than 100 language options to select for translation including the languages that meet the Safe Harbor Provision. If a member of the public does not have access to a computer or the internet, Fort Bend Transit can provide this information in print in their desired language. Fort Bend County also has an agreement with several translation services that offer language and sign language interpreting services.

Training for Staff

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will provide staff with a copy of the LEP Plan and provide training for all employees including new hires. Training topics will include:

- Understanding the Title VI policy and LEP responsibilities;
- What language assistance services the Public Transportation Department offers;
- Instructions on how to document language assistance requests; and
- How to handle complaints.

Monitoring and Updating the LEP Plan

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will monitor and evaluate changes in LEP population through available demographic information to determine the growing incidence of other languages and potential need for language accommodation.

The LEP plan is designed to be flexible and can be easily updated. Each triennial update should examine components such as the following:

- Was the need for language assistance provided? If not, why not? If yes, how was the assistance was provided?
- Were any complaints received?
- Has there been any change in the types of languages where translation services are needed?
- What is the current LEP population in the service area?
- Is there still a need for continued language assistance for previously identified programs or services? Are there other programs or services that should be included?
- Have the goals of the LEP Plan been accomplished?

TRIENNIAL REPORTS

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will prepare and submit a Title VI Program to FTA every three years beginning in 2009. The program will include the following information at a minimum:

- Evidence of notice to the public that the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department complies with Title VI and instructions to the public on how to file a discrimination complaint;
- Procedures for tracking and investigating Title VI complaints;
- List of any Title VI investigations, complaints, or lawsuits;
- Summary of public outreach and involvement activities and steps undertaken to ensure that minority and low-income people have meaningful access to these activities; and
- Plan for providing language assistance for persons with limited English proficiency.

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SECTION 6. SERVICES STANDARDS AND POLICIES FOR TRANSIT IN LARGE URBAN AREAS

According to the FTA Circular 4702.1B program-specific guidance for recipients that provide transit service in a large urban area, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department should adopt quantitative system-wide service standards and policies to guard against service design and operational policies that have disparate impacts. The department is also required to monitor transit service throughout the county to ensure that minority groups and low-income populations are beneficiaries of transit services. Every three years, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department is required to document compliance.

The purpose of this section is to document Fort Bend County compliance with the FTA Circular 4702.1B program-specific guidance for recipients that provide transit service in a large urban area.

SERVICE STANDARDS AND SERVICE POLICIES

Fort Bend County public transportation services are either demand response or commuter bus. As a result, the service standards and policies have specific requirements, different from traditional service standards that include local fixed-route service. The following paragraphs include the service standards and service policies for the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department.

Service Coverage

Coverage refers to the geographic area where transit services are provided.

Span of Service

Span of service refers to the days of the week and the hours that service is available.

Service Frequency

Vehicle headway refers to the time interval between vehicles travelling the same direction on the same route.

Load Factor

Service Reliability (On-Time Performance)

On-time performance is a measure of service reliability.

Vehicle Assignment

Vehicle assignment refers to the process by which transit vehicles are placed into service throughout the system.

Standard: Buses are assigned to ensure the best match of vehicle specifications to the types of transit service to be provided. Vehicles will be assigned on the basis of safety, efficiency, and performance. Vehicle will not be assigned with the intent to provide preference or benefit to any geographic service area or any passenger.

Passenger Amenities

Passenger amenities include bus stops, benches, and shelters for the convenience of passengers who must wait for fixed route buses on schedule.

REVIEW OF SYSTEM-WIDE SERVICE CHANGES AND FARE INCREASES

In order to comply with Title VI requirements, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will evaluate significant system-wide service and fare changes and proposed service improvements at the planning and programming stages to determine whether those changes have a discriminatory impact on minority and low-income populations.

The Public Transportation Department will follow the Public Participation Plan (PPP) when evaluating significant system-wide service, fare changes, and proposed service improvements:

Under FTA guidelines, Fort Bend County can implement a fare increase or major service change that would have disproportionately high and adverse effects on minority and low- income riders provided the Public Transportation Department demonstrates that the action meets a substantial need that is in the public interest and that alternatives would have more severe adverse effects than the preferred alternative.

REVIEW FOR TITLE VI COMPLIANCE

As a way to ensure Title VI compliance, the Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will monitor Title VI related service factors. The review will include the following steps:

- Record of Complaints: The Public Transportation Department will investigate and track Title VI complaints according to the adopted procedures. Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department will maintain a list of any active investigations conducted by entities other than FTA, which includes lawsuits and complaints.
- Ridership Data: The Public Transportation Department will monitor the location of riders of transit services and compare to the most current demographic data to ensure no discriminatory service. The department will include questions to ascertain rider characteristics for Title VI demographics in periodic surveys of transit riders.

- Changes in Service: The Public Transportation Department will evaluate and modify any change in service in order to eliminate or mitigate adverse effects or discrimination that could occur as a result of the change. Changes in service include changes in routes, hours of operation, frequency of service, reduction of service, or elimination of service.
- LEP Plan: The Public Transportation Department will provide language assistance in Spanish for persons with limited English proficiency according to the LEP Plan. In addition, the department will monitor available information to anticipate the need for languages other than English and Spanish. Information on LEP populations will be obtained from ACS data and other relevant sources as available. This will help track growth of specific languages in the county and provide insight into what languages people in the general public may need assistance.
- Public Outreach: The Public Transportation Department will maintain a list of all public outreach initiatives and presentation. Records will be reviewed periodically to ensure that minority, low-income, and LEP persons have meaningful access to public outreach activities.




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Chapter 1- Introduction

Fort Bend County Transit Plan

Fort Bend Counly, Texas is located southwest of the City of Houston and Harris County and is comprised of 562,560 acres. Fort Bend County is one of the fastest growing counties in the United States and is transitioning from being more rural to being a mix of rural and urban development. It is recognized as a county with a strong economic base, experiencing significant growth in the residential, commercial, and industrial sectors. An increase in traffic congestion in Fort Bend County has been a result of the extensive growth and development. This growth has created intra-county and inter-county mobility challenges. In an effort to respond to the growing demand for improved mobility and connectivity, Fort Bend County formed the Public Transportation Department in June 2005 to provide residents with safe and efficient public transportation services. Fort Bend County currently provides demand response and commuter routes. In 2014, demand response services are utilizing 19 buses performing 515 trips per day within Fort Bend County., Commuter park and ride services are utilizing 15 buses performing 1,100 trips per day into major business districts in Harris County Texas. Commuter service originates from 3 park and ride lots, 1 in Rosenberg and 2 in Sugar Land. Services operate Monday through Friday excluding county holidays. Buses leave the depots between 4:30 and 8:15 a.m. and return between 3:15 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. Under the New Freedom program Fort Bend County provides ambassador services to compliment bus services for elderly passengers or passengers who need special assistance due to cognitive or physical challenges. Ambassador services include assistance with boarding and alighting vehicles and hand to hand transfers for individuals with cognitive concerns.

Fort Bend County does not provide any bus service directly. Bus operations, including dispatching and maintenance are provided by a contracted private sector provider. The service contractor employs drivers, route supervisors, dispatchers, and mechanics. Ambassador services are also contracted to the private sector. This service provider provides the ambassadors and related supervision services. County staff provide reservation, scheduling and administrative activities.

Transportation related activities are performed from 4 locations in Sugar Land, Texas. Reservations, scheduling, and administrative staff are housed at 12550 Emily Court (Administrative Facility). The parking lot at this location is used in the evening for overflow bus parking and during the day for overflow employee parking. The building is a County owned office building also housing the County's Tax Office and Juvinile Courts. Reservations and scheduling staff are located on one side of the building while administrative staff are on the other.

Dispatchers and Drivers are located at a second facility on Eldridge Road (Operations Facility). This building is also owned by the County and serves as the primary depot for transit operations. The majority of the revenue fleet (62 buses) is stored at this location and approximately 75 people report to this facility on a daily basis. Ambassadors utilize this facility as well and on any given day there are at least 8 employees going in and out of the facility for these services.

Vehicle maintenance is performed at a leased site also on Eldrige Road (Maintenance Facility). The leased space has 2 bays and four staff are permanently assigned to this facility. The majority of bus fueling is done at a County owned fuel site on Dairy Ashford Road. Buses can use County owned fuel sites in other areas of the County however this rarly occurs because of operational policies prohibiting fueling while passengers are on board. Buses owned by our bus service contractor are fueled at regular retail locations.

Cash fares are counted at the Eldridge Operations Facility while Ticket book sales are done from the Administrative offices.

Existing Executive/Administrative Staff

Currently, the Executive/Administrative/Operating staff located at the Administrative Building totals 17 individuals. Staff members utilize individual offices that have adequate space or cubicles that are located on opposite sides of the building, with other County offices in-between. Access into the transit sections of the building is in or near the main entry. There is limited room for the addition of new staff members and no dedicated space for ITS repairs or storage.

Contracted Operations and Maintenance Staff (First Transit)

Currently, the bus service Contractor employs 78 Operations and Maintenance staff. Contract staff related to bus oprations are located at t 1809 Eldridge Parkway and Maintenance staff are located at 1723 B Eldridge Parkway.

- 1 maintenance manager;
- 1 office manager;
- · 1 assistant general manager; and
- 1 general manager.



The cost of the 78 positions described above is built into the hourly rate that is charged to Fort Bend County for each hour of service operated on the street each day.

Contracted Ambassador Services

Ambassdors provide mobility assistance with boarding and alighting vehicles and hand to hand transfers for individuals with cognitive concerns. Currenlty the ambassador service provider employs 1 supervisor and 8 ambassadors. Because of parking constraints at the Eldridge depot the ambassadors park at the administration facility on Emily Court and buses travel from the Eldridge depot each day to pick up and drop off the ambassadors. The supervisor is officed at the administration facility.

Space Use of Existing Transit Facilities

Currently there are four facilities in use by Fort Bend County Transit. They are used to house the Executive /Administrative staff, Operations and Maintenance Staff and to store revenue and non-revenue vehicles. The four facilities and their locations are:

• 12550 Emily Court — this facility is used to house the Executive and Administrative staff and the Operations Manager and staff. Supervisors for the contracted Ambassador program are loated at this facility while ambassadors report in and out of the Operations Facility on Eldridge. This facility is also used as an overflow facility for the parking of transit buses. The administrative and operations staff are located on opposite sides of the building with other county offices in-between. The Administrative side has a small conference room (accommodates 10 people) and the Operations side has a larger conference room (accommodate approximately 20 people). Approximately 5600 sq ft of space is used in this facility to accommodate all administrative activities, reservations, route scheduling, ambassador

program supervision, and ITS equipment storage and maintenance. As a general rule, on the Administrative side of the building, Executive staff are housed in separate office spaces with administrative assistanants sharing a larger common area. There is a small storage room that houses the copy machine and files with the small conference room doubling as the employee lunch area.

- 1809 Eldridge Parkway this facility is used to house the bus service contractors. The Site Manager and related staff which includes 60 bus operators, fleet maintenance personnel and ambassador contractor staff report in and out of this location. This facility serves as the depot for bus operations and the majority of the bus fleet is stored here in the evening. The office building is made up of approximately 2530 square feet of office space containing separate areas for supervisors, dispatchers, drivers and fare counting. The building has only 1 sngle stall men's and 1 single stall women's restroom and a small kithchen area. Vehicle storage is so inadequate that buses parked nose to tail in the evenings take up the entire bus parking area, with no room for expansion. Employee parking is as inadequate as the bus parking with several employees needing to double park vehicles in order to accommodate visitor parking and buses passing through the employee parking area.
- 1723B Eldridge Parkway this facility is used to house maintenance and repair operations for the Fort Bend County Transit bus fleet and is a leased space provided by the bus service operator. There is no office space at this site to accommodate a maintenance supervisor and only 2 bays are available for bus repairs.
- 12919 Dairy Ashford Road This is a County owned fueling facility located approximately 3 miles from
 the bus depot on Eldridge road. All County owned buses are fueled at this facility. This site includes
 other county offices that are secured behind a security fence which is only open between the hours of
 7:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Due to security policies only one access key is provided to the bus service
 contractor. After hours fueling requires someone on site to open and close the security gates as buses
 come in or leave for routes.

The first three facilities described above are currently operating beyond the maximum capacity of their design and considerable time and money must be spent each year to make these facilities "work". Examples of the difficulties associated with operating a transit operation between four facilities are:

- Considerable time and money are consumed each year transferring buses between each of the four
 facilities. For example, buses that cannot be stored at the Eldridge facilities must be driven to the Emily
 road office to be stored in their parking lot. If all of the vehicles needed to operate bus service were
 stored in one central secured facility, considerable savings could be realized;
- The costs of fueling vehicles at a location over 2-1/2 miles from the depot are significant. The bus service contract provides payment to the contracxtor for all service hours. Considerable savings could be realized eliminating travel to and from the fueling station by fueling the vehicles on the same site as the depot. The three County facilities that park revenue vehicles are not designed to provide that service. Entrances, exits and parking lots were designed to accomadate vehicle and not bus movement. These facilities have no extra capacity to park existing or future bus fleets.

The leased maintenance facility was not designed for transit bus repairs. The facility has no built in lift, parts storage or parking lot for employees or buses awaiting repairs. There is no bus wash facility and bus washing is currently done by hand.

Chapter 2- Demand Analysis

Background

Fort Bend County is the fastest growing county in the state of Texas and is one of the fastest growing counties in the nation. Fort Bend County's rapid population and employment growth have contributed to considerable increases in traffic congestion. Major roadways and highways in the urbanized portion of the county currently experience significant congestion during peak periods, resulting in declining transportation mobility and impacts to the air quality. Travel demand continues to outpace the region's ability to add vehicle capacity to the highway system. With the extensive amount of growth, it has become increasingly important to provide alternatives to the use of single-occupancy vehicles. Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department addresses some of the demand for improved mobility with existing and new Park and Ride/commuter service.

Fort Bend County has experienced tremendous growth during the past decade with continued growth projected for the next decade.




Figure 1 - Projected County Population Growth¹

The employment base in Fort Bend County also increased over the past ten years. The Bureau of Economic Analysis (US Department of Commerce) develops employment estimates for counties and states. The Bureau estimated that total nonfarm employment in Fort Bend County grew from 141,476 full-time and part-time jobs

in 2000 to 227,343 jobs by 2008. This represents an increase of approximately 61 percent over the eight-year period.

The population in Fort Bend County is expected to continue to grow at a stable rate over the next 25 years. Substantial population growth is anticipated through 2035, with Fort Bend County's total population nearly doubling in the 25 years between 2010 and 2035. It is projected that Fort Bend County will continue to attract new residential development and it can be assumed that improvements in area infrastructure and amenities will also grow with the increased development.

Future Transit Service

In January 2011, Fort Bend County Transit completed a **Long Range Transit Plan 2011** – **2035**. In that plan, **Section 4** discusses the County's development and transit development as the basis for future discussion. Various groups within Fort Bend County and the Cities of Sugar Land and Rosenberg and other municipalities either have conducted or are conducting transportation planning studies. Across every study the overall message conveyed by the public and elected officials is that expanding the transit system is important and that an integrated transportation system with multiple options for travel within the County and the region is important to develop.

The vision developed and reported in The County's Long Range Transit Plan contains the following proposed future plans:

- Continuation and expansion of demand-response bus and van service throughout the lower density
 portions of the County. These services are expected to become feeder routes to future fixed route
 transit;
- Development of fixed route local service in urban areas;
- The expansion of commuter bus service to major employment centers in Harris County. This will
 include the expansion of County-owned park and ride facilities;
- The introduction of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) along certain corridors that can accommodate higher speed travel;
- Local circulator service within the municipalities that may or may not intersect with other regional providers;
- · Development of Suburban Light Rail; and
- Development of Commuter Rail.
- As the transit system grows, FBCT will need to purchase larger transit vehicles in the range of a 50' transit bus. These buses when purchased will not be able to be serviced at the facilities currently utilized. A larger facility will be needed to service these newer vehicles.

General Findings of the Long-Range Plan

Fort Bend County's need for transit services is projected to grow over the next 25 years. This growth will
be based on several factors including increased population, increased density of jobs, growth in
employment centers adjacent to Fort Bend County and a growth in the overall transit need. Increased

travel times will shorten the timeframe for future development as citizens will demand more transit the longer travel times become;

- The growth in demand for service is expected to be local/intra-county trips and commuter trips to urban centers outside of Fort Bend County.
- The demand for service within the cities of Sugar Land, Stafford, Missouri City, Richmond and Rosenberg
 will grow as well as demand for new service between these cities.

Although some of the proposals described above are still in discussion stages and firm dates of implementation have not been set, it is important to realize that any sustained level of expansion will require the pre-existence of a Command Center/Bus Operating Facility that will be able to service a near future bus need of approximately 100 revenue vehicles. It is recommended that a bus operating facility be in place that will capture the benefits (including cost savings) of having that type of County facility before any sustained increase in bus operations begins.

Future Staffing Levels

To efficiently and effectively accommodate a future bus fleet of approximately 100 to 125 vehicles, it will be necessary to have the capacity to add to the existing staff in all functional areas and to consolidate all of the activities currently provided in separate locations. It is estimated that a number of positions will need to be added in every department to accommodate growth in the system.



Chapter 3- Site Selection Analysis

Candidate Sites

19 sites were presented as candidates for the new transit facility. These sites contain locations in rural, urban and suburban areas of the county.




Figure 2 - Candidate Sites

Evaluation Criteria

To evaluate the sites the county assembled a team comprised of:

- Director of Transit
- · Transit Operations Manager
- County Engineering
- Facility Consultant
- County Judges Office
- Precinct Representatives
- General Public Representative
 Passenger Representative
- Elderly/Disabled Representative

An initial focus group consisting of the director, operations manager, engineering and the consultant defined the criteria for evaluation and generated a first pass scoring sheet for all of the sites listed above. The sites were evaluated against a list of criteria and scored to provide suitable candidates for further investigation. The criteria used for each site are listed below. Once the initial evaluation was completed, the county assembled the entire team to receive the focus groups findings and to review and comment on the evaluations and to provide any new information. At the conclusion of this activity the county had identified the highest scoring four (4) sites. These four sites are evaluated in this report.

Evaluation Findings & Rankings

Nominated Sites

The sites scored from 71 to 130 points, out of a possible 150, with the average being 103. The median score was 115. The seven sites scoring 120 points or more were presented to the entire team for vetting and discussion. Figure 2 shows the scores for all sites.

The top four scoring sites are discussed in more detail as follows.

Site 1- Bamore Extension NE, Rosenberg (Fairgrounds)

Description of Site

This site is located south of Highway 59 and west of Highway 36 in Rosenberg. The site is part of a rural, 50 acre tract currently owned by the county. Requiring only 20 acres the transit facility could comfortably occupy a portion of the land furthest away from the nearby subdivisions. The site is adjacent a County fuel depot as well as bulk fuel storage.

Observations

The property is currently owned by the county so acquisition and purchasing activities would not be necessary. The current access to the property from I-69 will improve greatly as the Bamore Road extension project completes the expansion of Bamore road to the southwest under I-69. This new connection will provide an additional route to I-69. The I-69 upgrade project will also improve access by adding entrance and exit ramps near the intersection of Cottonwood School Road and highway 59 (I-69) Both of these projects are expected to be completed within the next 5 years.

Electric utilities exist on the site. A line of poles follows the the drainage ditch on the southwest side of the property. The property resides in Ft. Bend MUD #148 which provides water and sewer through the City of Rosenberg.

The map below shows the site lies outside of any currently defined flood zone. Flood zones are defined as either light blue or dark blue areas depending on the level of flook exposure.



Site 2- 14000 University, Sugar Land (U of H; Admin Only)

Description of Site

The site is located near the intersection of Highway 59 and University Blvd. in Sugar Land. This site is currently home to the University of Houston's Sugar Land campus. The university owns approximately 245 acres at this location. The exact location for the facility has yet to be determined. The caveat for this location is the restriction that this be the administrative arm only. The maintenance facility will be required to be located elsewhere due to zoning and land-use restrictions by both the city of Sugar Land and the University of Houston System.

Observations

Although large, the site is split into three parts by a pair of drainage ditches shown in figure 7. This leaves the parcels likely to be provided for this facility largely undeveloped and in need of infrastructure. Connector roads would be needed to either the I-69 frontage road or University Blvd. TxDOT is currently planning additional entrance and exit ramps from I-69 in this area. Final placement of these ramps would affect the location of the connector roads to maximize efficiency. This site also offers advantages by being located near an existing park and ride lot providing added convenience to passengers. This site, and the partnership with the University of Houston offer some unique opportunities in joint training, internships and college programs in transportation and urban planning.

The site lies in Ft. Bend County MUD #139 serviced by the City of Sugar Land. Electrical utilities are also nearby.

Concerns

The restrictions placed on the use of this site will require the county to construct the maintenance facility elsewhere. This split-site configuration carries additional costs of construction as well as preventing the transit department from being co-located in a single facility.

Flood Plain

The site lies in an area protected by a levee system as shown by the gray shaded area.

Site 3 - SW Corner of Hwy-90 and Hwy-6, Sugar Land

Description of Site

This site is located south of Highway 90 and west of Highway 6 in Sugar Land. The site is part of an area of vacant land, part of which is underneath the aviation zone of runway 35 of the Sugar Land Regional airport. Requiring only 20 acres the transit facility could comfortably occupy the eastern portion of the area avoiding all of the airport zoning issues. The area highlighted in 'pink' encompasses approximately 27 acres.

Observations

The property is currently not up for sale and the current parcel layout may not exactly match the county requirements. The county may have to acquire additional land in the direct avigation area that would be difficult to develop in the future.

The location does offer intermodal opportunites due to the proximity with the Sugar Land Regional airport.

There is currently no direct access from the site to either Hwy 6 or Hwy 90. The county would need to petition TxDOT for direct access, or create surface street infrastructure to access one or both of these thoroughfares.

Electric utilities exist on the site. A line of poles follows the contoured edge adjacent to the state owned parcel. Water and sewer utilities are nearby on both sides currently serving adjacent developed properties. This site is a greenfield site and would require development of a complete installation including a fuel depot.

The map below shows the flood zones in the area, shaded in blue, and the site lies outside of any currently defined flood zone.

Access

TxDOT defines the minimum distance from the intersection the county would be allowed to create a driveway. The distances available at this site allow for full compliance with these requirements. In fact the driveway could be as much as 1000' away from Hwy 90 on the Hwy 6 frontage road and as much as 3000' away from Hwy 6 on Hwy 90 providing ample room for vehicles to enter and exit the highways.

Concerns

- The property is likely to be expensive to obtain.
- Even with driveways being allowed on both Hwy 90 and Hwy 6, the available directions of travel are
 limited. In order to go northbound on Hwy 6 a bus will have to travel southbound, approximately 0.4
 miles to University Dr. to U-Turn and head north. Buses wishing to travel westbound on Hw90 will have
 similar issues but without the benefit of a U-Turn lane they will be subjected to as many as four traffic
 lights to make the U-Turn. TxDOT would have to approve a connection between the east and
 westbound lanes of Hwy 90 to mitigate this condition. The county would likely bear this cost.
- . Buses travelling north on Hwy 6 are subject to delays and inherent safety issues from train traffic.

Site 4- SE Corner, Bamore and Hwy 59

Description of Site

This site is located south of Highway 59 and west of Highway 36 in Rosenberg. The site is part of a 50 acre tract currently owned by the county. Requiring only 20 acres the transit facility could comfortably occupy a portion of the land closest to Highway 59 for ease of access. The site is near the County's fuel depot which includes distribution facilities as well as bulk fuel storage.

Observations

The property is currently owned by the county so acquisition and purchase would be trivial. The current access to the property from I-69 will improve greatly as the Bamore Road extension project completes along with the I-69 upgrade project.

Electric utilities exist on the site. A line of poles follows the the drainage ditch on the southwest side of the property. The property resides in Ft. Bend MUD #148 which provides water and sewer through the City of Rosenberg.

Concerns

The site abuts the residential area and the residents on Enchanted Springs Dr. may be averse to having a bus facility literally in their back yard.

The map below shows the site lies outside of any currently defined flood zone, areas shaded in blue.

Chapter- 4 Site Layout

Three of the four sites allow for a combined operation including an administration building, a maintenance facility and bus parking and servicing areas. Figure 14 shows a typical representation of this type of facility. Site #2 precludes all of this except for the office building and associated employee parking. The remaining facilities would be located on the sister site.




Figure 15 - Typical Site Layout

Chapter 5-Operating Plan

Current Operations

Fort Bend County Transit currently operates from three locations, two on County owned properties and one leased warehouse space being used for vehicle maintenance. There is also a fourth location that our transit vehicles drive to for refueling before returning to the yard at the end of the routes. Transit operations from these multiple locations present several factors that affect daily costs of operations and prevent efficient use of equipment and staff.

Buses are stored and pull out from our County facility located at 1809 Eldridge Rd., Sugar Land. That property is too small to handle parking for the current fleet, drivers and operations staff. Several staff members are dedicated each evening and morning to the task of moving buses around to make room to get all buses on the lot at the end of the day and to make scheduled pullouts each morning. Some drivers are required to pull their bus out and park their personal vehicle in the bus space. Mechanics coming from the shop are frequently required to move other buses to get to the vehicle they need for maintenance work and to relocate other buses when a vehicle is returned to the lot after maintenance work is performed.

The building does not lend itself to efficient use with drivers having to pass thru the Dispatch area to get to managers or to pick up or deliver route paperwork. Temporary walls separating supervisory personnel and other functions challenge productivity, confidentiality and efficiency. The building has two small, single-stall restrooms for a staff of over 60 employees.

Fort Bend County also operates an Ambassador Program to provide assistance for elderly and disabled passengers. Due to the lack of room for employee parking at the Eldridge Rd. location, the ambassador employees park at our Emily Court offices and a bus pulling out from 1809 Eldridge must drive 2 miles to Emily Court at the beginning and end of each route to pick up and drop off the ambassador assigned to the route.

Bus maintenance is currently being performed in two rented warehouse bays located at 1723 Eldridge Rd., Sugar Land. This property is adjacent to the Bus storage facility but requires street travel to get from one location to the other. Buses being returned to the parking lot must be driven a distance of one mile through a residential neighborhood behind the bus facility. Combined with the need to shuffle buses to get in and out of the parking lot additional mechanics time is spent moving buses between the facilities instead of performing repairs

Bus fueling operations occur at a location on Dairy Ashford Rd., 2.5 miles from where the buses are housed. That location contains other County equipment and is secured behind a closed gate after regular business hours. A transit supervisor is assigned to monitor, open and close the gate for buses to refuel at the end of their route. This adds unnecessary miles and hours to the operations.

Savings For Unified Location of Operations

Placing all transit operations in a unified location would alleviate all the operational issues noted above. Some savings are easy to "quantify". Others are a bit more subjective.

Removing the need for staff to relocate buses for parking would save approximately 10 employee hours per day. Onsite fueling would remove the need for a supervisor at the fuel site, saving approximately 3 hours per day. Buses parked adjacent to and having direct access to the maintenance bays would save approximately 4 hours per day for maintenance staff.

The current operations agreement pays for contracted service based on "Service Hour" which is gate-to-gate. With fueling being done offsite re-fueling time is part of the billed hours of service. Having on-site fueling would reduce that cost of contracted operations. With 38 routes, estimating 15 minutes per bus to drive to the fuel site and fill up, with 252 annual service days, on-site fueling would save approximately \$120,000 per year in non-revenue Service Hour costs.

Currently 6 routes scheduled for Ambassadors operate an additional 20 minutes per day picking up and dropping off the employee at our Emily Court location. A unified site with sufficient space for these employees would save approximately \$25,000 per year in non-revenue Service Hour costs.

These savings are related to a unified transit operations site versus current operations. These savings can be realized without regard to the transit facility site location. Bringing these portions of the daily operations into one shared location will enhance efficiency, improve overall operations and cut non-revenue related costs.

Implementation Plan/Timeline

The current implementation plan shows facility design completing in the summer of 2015. Construction could potentially start in the late fall with approval of federal funding or a letter of no prejudice, LONP, from FTA. The project is included in the transportation improvement program, TIP, and the environmental recommendation for a categorical exclusion is provided as a supplement to this document. Both of these are required for a LONP approval. With an environmental concurrence and LONP approval the county could consider phasing the construction using bond funds already committed to the projects local match requirement. Phase 1 could address bus storage and maintenance concerns with immediate construction of those facilities. Phase 2 which would include the administrative facilities could then be completed once federal resources were secured.

Chapter 6 - Financial Plan

Operating and Maintenance Costs

Fort Bend County utilizes a Contracted Bus service that is paid a turn key rate by the "Service Hour". Fort Bend County opeates and maintains the Emily Court and Dairy Ashford facilities. The contract service provider is responsible for operating and maintaining the Eldridge Depot and leases the maintenance facility on Eldridge.

The turn-key rate includes routine costs to maintain the county-owned depot. Major sturcutural, utility or other concerns are borne by the county. The county expects to continue this operating model at the new site.

Chapter 7 - Public Outreach

Public Meeting and Comment

In keeping with guidelines suggested by FTA, FHWA and NEPA, the county advertised a meeting to solicit public comment. The advertising period began in early December 2014 and ran through mid-January of 2015. Flyers were distributed to the businesses and residences surrounding the selected site as well as placed on all transit buses. Advertisements in both English and Spanish were published in local newspapers.

A public meeting was held on January 15, 2015 at the Fort Bend County Fairgrounds Site to provide additional public awareness and collect any comments.

The meeting was lightly attended and no comments were received on this project.

Two local papers published follow up articles on the project.

Conclusion

The county recognizes the need to consolidate the transit services into a single, streamlined and efficient operational facility. The site selection analysis allowed the commissioners to select the fairgrounds, site #1, as the preferred site to develop for this facility. The environmental assessment, provided as appendices to this document, also support this location. Moving forward with this project allows the county to achieve key elements of the long range transit plan:

- Continuation and expansion of demand-response bus and van service throughout the lower density
 portions of the County. These services are expected to become feeder routes to future fixed route
 transit:
- Development of fixed route local service in urban areas;
- · The expansion of commuter bus service to major employment centers in Harris County.
- The introduction of Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) along certain corridors that can accommodate higher speed travel;
- Local circulator service within the municipalities that may or may not intersect with other regional providers;
- Support for larger transit vehicles i.e. a 50' transit bus.

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CHAPTER 3 — SITE SELECTION ANALYSIS

CANDIDATE SITES

Based on current demographics in the corridor, traffic volumes, area travel times and current operation of park and ride service, a number of sites in the Westpark Corridor have been identified as candidate locations for providing park and ride service. It has been determined that a 200 to 300 space park and ride lot would be the appropriate size for the park and ride facility given projected demand and available transit vehicles to service the facility. An eight to ten acre site was deemed to be the appropriate size to accommodate the parking needs, drainage and detention on site, passenger amenities, bus circulation and future expansion, if needed. Finally, in identifying prospective sites, particular attention was given to sites that were undeveloped and had frontage or good access to Westpark/FM 1093.

Six sites along the Westpark Corridor were identified as potential locations for the Park and Ride facility. These sites include:

- Westpark/FM 1093 @ SH 99 (northwest corner)
- Westpark/FM 1093 @ SH 99 (southwest corner, behind planned commercial development)
- Mason Road just north of Westpark (northwest, behind existing commercial development)
- Westpark/FM 1093 between Grand Mission and Mason Rd (north side, outbound direction – property owned by Fort Bend County)
- Westpark/FM 1093 @ Peek Road (southwest/southeast corners)
- 6. Westpark/FM 1093 @Canal (southwest corner)

Figure 6 provides a map with the locations of the prospective Park and Ride sites.

PROPOSED SITES

DESCRIPTION OF SITES

Each of the prospective sites considered for Park and Ride development are located along or adjacent to the Westpark Tollroad and are accessible from the surrounding neighborhoods. As part of evaluating each site, an initial site survey and examination was conducted to assess the development possibilities. The following is a summary of the initial assessment of each site:


SITE 1 - WESTPARK/SH 99 (northwest corner)



<u>Description of Site</u> – 30+ acres undeveloped property located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Westpark/FM 1093 and SH 99. The site is across from the Westpark Tollroad terminus, where the tollroad structure meets the grade at FM 1093. The site is adjacent to the Seven Meadows development on the west. To the south, across Westpark/FM 1093, is a large retail development.

<u>Observations</u> – a retaining wall is built around the eastern and southern perimeter of the property. It appears that the area has been platted for a roadway that could be the northern extension of Canal Road. The grade of the property is different than the grade of SH 99. This is a large site that could accommodate current and future demand for Park and Ride demand, but additional roadway improvements, access, and traffic control would be required.

Concerns – access to this site would be difficult; no access from SH 99 would be possible due to the severe change in grade and current obstruction of a retaining wall. Not able to access site from the west on FM 1093 due to obstruction of the Westpark Tollroad ramp. Future plans for the extension of the Westpark Tollroad would further impact access from FM 1093. Traffic congestion in the vicinity of the intersection during peak periods would impact ingress and egress to site. Due to the significant difference in elevation of site and adjacent SH 99, drainage at the site could be a concern.






<u>Description of Site</u> – site is approximately 5 acres undeveloped property located near the southwest corner of the intersection of Westpark/FM 1093 and SH 99. Drainage improvements have been constructed. The site is across from Westpark Tollroad where the structure meets FM 1093 at grade and serves as the current terminus of toll facility. Site is adjacent to a major retail development and the northeast border of the Lakes of Bella Terra subdivision.

Observations – the site is being prepared for construction and therefore property may not be available for Park and Ride lot development. There is good access from eastbound FM 1093 and Canal Road. Not accessible from westbound FM 1093, due to obstruction of Westpark ramp. Access is also available from SH 99 on Bella Terra Parkway (small arterial extending from SH 99 to Canal Street, bisecting retail development). Location may be good for future development of commuter rail station, but limited in size, due to existing and planned retail development. Location may offer transit oriented development opportunities.

<u>Concerns</u> – site may not be big enough to accommodate Park and Ride needs. Site would not offer room for expansion. Site may not be available for potential P&R site due to pending commercial development in the area. Canal Road is a two lane open ditch roadway and will require upgrading in order to serve a future park and ride site.






<u>Description of Site</u> – 7 acre undeveloped site located on Mason Road, just north of Westpark/FM1093. Access to site is from Mason Road. The northern edge of the site is adjacent to the levee and is south of the Cinco Ranch development.

Observations – the site is visible, but not accessible from Westpark/FM 1093. The 7 acre site is long and narrow. The intersection of FM 1093 and Mason Road is signalized but the access would only be from Mason Road. Mason Road connects both to the north and south of Westpark Tollroad, accommodating access in all directions. Site provides mixed use and transit oriented development (TOD) opportunities.

<u>Concerns</u> – given the close proximity to the levee and elevation of the site, it appears that drainage and flooding would be an issue. The site is located in the 500 year floodplain. Site lacks frontage on FM 1093 and therefore may not be as attractive. Limited access from northbound and southbound Mason Road may present a traffic problem. The long narrow configuration of site may impact bus and auto circulation at the site.





<u>Description of Site</u> – 10 acre undeveloped site fronting Westpark/FM 1093 between Mason Road and Grand Mission Blvd. (.8 miles east of Mason Road and .3 miles west of Grand Mission Blvd.) Property is owned by the County. Northern edge of site is adjacent to the levee.

Observations – Large, rectangle shaped site located mid-block on FM 1093. Site could accommodate current and future Park and Ride demand. Site can easily accommodate parking requirements, bus circulation and operation and passenger amenities. Site would have limited access from westbound FM 1093. From initial examination, slope and elevation of site appear good and site from initial inspection appears to drain well, though the site is located in the 500 year floodplain. It could be possible to have multiple access points from FM 1093 to enhance circulation. Site could be candidate for joint use and TOD opportunities. Site could also connect to proposed hike and bike path located along the levee.

<u>Concerns</u> – mid-block site limits access. All eastbound traffic to site would have to Uturn at Grand Mission Blvd to access site. For the AM commute to major employment centers (e.g. Uptown Galleria, Greenway Plaza, Texas Medical, Downtown Houston), bus service would have to travel west to Mason Road and then U-turn to head east toward the employment centers. The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) will need to approve access points to the site.

 SITE 5 - WESTPARK @ PEEK ROAD (south side of Westpark - 2 potential sites)



Site A

<u>Description of Site</u> – undeveloped site located at the southwest corner of the intersection of FM 1093 and Peek Road. Site appears to be available for lease or sale, though platted for commercial development. Though site is over 10 acres, site may be an aggregate of multiple properties. Peek Road is a four lane divided roadway that connects north and south of the Westpark Tollroad/FM 1093.

<u>Observations</u> – site has good access from all directions and would be a good candidate for TOD. Being on the south side of Westpark Tollroad, site is good for future development of a commuter rail station. Site is part of large real estate development associated with Ferguson.

<u>Concerns</u> – site may be expensive as it is already platted for commercial development. Peek Road currently experiences heavy traffic volumes during the AM peak.




Site B

<u>Description of Site</u> – undeveloped site located at the southeast corner of the intersection of FM 1093 and Peek Road. Site is smaller than the site to the west (estimated 7 acres) across Peek Road. Peek Road is a four lane divided roadway that connects north and south of the Westpark Tollroad/FM 1093. Site is adjacent to homes on both the east and south sides of the property.

<u>Observations</u> – site has good access from all directions and would be a good candidate for TOD. Being on the south side of Westpark Tollroad, site is good for future development of a commuter rail station. This site is smaller than the site to the west and could potentially impact neighboring residential developments.

<u>Concerns</u> – site may be expensive as it is located in the Lost Creek subdivision which is already developed. The apparent smaller size of the property limits future options for expansion.





<u>Description of Site</u> – 15+ acres undeveloped property located at the Southwest corner of FM 1093 and Canal Road. The site is across from the Westpark Tollroad terminus, where the aerial structure is coming to grade. The site is located at the northeastern edge of the Lakes of Bella Terra development. Just across Canal Road to the east is a large retail development. Bella Terra Parkway connects the site from the east, extending from the SH 99 frontage road.

Roadway Network - Canal Road from FM 1093 to Bellaire Boulevard (2 lane undivided, open ditch), FM 1093 eastbound (2 lanes), Westpark Tollroad grade separation coming to grade and merging with FM 1093

Observations – large, undeveloped site with access from FM 1093 eastbound, Canal Road and SH 99 southbound (via Bella Terra Parkway). Site is adjacent to both residential development and large commercial development. Being on the south side of Westpark Tollroad, site may provide an opportunity for future development of a commuter rail station and appears to have TOD opportunities. Plans for the extension of Katy-Gaston Road may enhance access to the site.

<u>Concerns</u> – westbound traffic on FM 1093 would not be able to access the site at Canal Road due to obstruction of the Westpark Tollroad ramp, but could access the site from southbound SH 99 frontage road. Future plans for the extension of the Westpark Tollroad may further impact ingress and egress.

SITE EVALUATION

In identifying and assessing opportunities and locations for providing park and ride services, a number of factors were addressed as part of the evaluation process. A series of evaluation criteria were developed to analyze and compare each site.

Identification of Evaluation Criteria

The evaluation process was designed to address the specific needs in the corridor. A number of factors were considered in the identification and development of the evaluation criteria and measurements:

- Evaluation criteria should relate to local demographics and mobility needs of the study area;
- Evaluation measures should be appropriate to address the stated objectives of the Park and Ride demand analysis and site selection;
- Efforts should be made to apply evaluation measures that quantify impacts rather than convey qualitative judgments on the nature of the impact; and
- Evaluation measures should provide the proper perspective on the magnitude of the impacts and/or associated benefit that result in the location and development of the park and ride facility.

In identifying the evaluation criteria, the goal was to develop an evaluation plan and methodology that addresses the mobility concerns of the corridor while effectively providing a comparison of various sites' strengths and weaknesses, costs and benefits, constructability, and mitigation requirements. The evaluation criteria address issues that are important to the vitality of the corridor and feasibility of implementation and analyze impacts and influences on mobility and travel patterns. In addition, the evaluation criteria provide a standard to assess impacts to and compatibility with the natural, manmade, and social environments. A list of evaluation criteria was developed that provide a thorough assessment of the alternatives. The criteria are designed to provide a tangible means for comparing the alternatives.

The evaluation was an iterative process and the findings from the initial evaluation of prospective sites led to a more in depth analysis and further evaluation of the identified sites and possible addition of other prospective sites. All prospective sites were evaluated objectively and potential fatal flaws were identified. Based on the evaluation criteria, if a potential site was found to have a fatal flaw, the site was dropped from further evaluation and consideration. The sites listed above were not found to have fatal flaws.

The following presents the criteria used to assess the alternatives in accordance with the requirements of the FTA evaluation process. **Table 10** provides a description of the evaluation criteria and objective of applying each criterion.

EVALUATION FINDINGS AND RANKINGS

In conducting the evaluation and comparing the prospective park and ride sites, it was found that there were commonalities among the sites. All of the sites are within close proximity to the Westpark Tollroad and SH 99 and therefore provide good global access for the commuters residing in the area. Also, all of the sites are undeveloped and future development would most likely not conflict with adjacent properties, nor result in any serious environmental impacts. While drainage concerns were cited, the development at any of the sites would include appropriate detention and drainage improvements.

The greatest differences among the sites were location and the quality of the connection to each site. The ease of access/egress at the site, roadway conditions and the visibility of the site provided a distinction among sites. Another evaluation criterion that played a role in the evaluation process was consistency with regional plans and joint use opportunities. In selecting a prospective site for the short term park and ride service, Fort Bend County also is anticipating the long term opportunity to coordinate park and ride and the potential commuter rail and local bus services in the future. Consideration was given to the future growth and extension of transit services in the corridor.

An evaluation matrix was developed listing the six candidate sites and all the evaluation criteria and a comparison was made between the findings at each site. **Table 12** provides the completed matrix of the evaluation findings in a narrative format.

Based on the findings in the matrix by criterion, each evaluation finding per site was categorized as being a positive attribute, neutral, or being a liability. The ranking of "+1" indicated that the site positively met the consideration of a particular evaluation criterion. A "0" ranking indicated the site had no positive or negative impact as related to the evaluation criterion. The "-1" ranking signified that the site did not meet the requirements of the specific evaluation criterion.

Applying values to the evaluation findings provided the quantitative means for assessing the sites. It was apparent that some of the criteria used to evaluate the sites were more critical to the success and effective operation of the park and ride service. Moreover, some of the evaluation criteria produced consistent findings among all the candidate sites and offered little comparison in performance. Differences were discernable between the sites in terms of cost, travel demand, accessibility and site availability and suitability. While the roadway direction, environmental concerns, and consistency with plans were all important considerations to address, these criteria did not have as direct an impact on the successful development of the site and implementation of service. Therefore, a weighting formula was established to ensure that the most critical evaluation criteria were given greater consideration reflective of the importance in the development of the site and implementation of the service. Table 11 provides the weights per criteria. Availability of Site, Suitability of Site,

Accessibility, Projected Demand and Cost were weighted twice as much as the other criteria, as these criteria are the key considerations in the selection of the most appropriate site development in the corridor.

A site review and group evaluation workshop was conducted, in which the members of the consultant team, in conjunction with staff from the Fort Bend County Department of Public Transportation, discussed and individually evaluated and rated each site based on the findings of evaluation analysis. Each site was rated criteria by criteria with the +1, 0, -1 measures and the weighted values were applied to the aggregate evaluation numbers and then totaled. By multiplying the weighted values to the evaluation scores, the differences between the sites became more apparent and the sites with the greatest potential received higher scores. **Table 13** provides the final evaluation findings.

The preferred site that emerged from the evaluation process was Site 4, located on the north side of FM 1093/Westpark Tollroad between Mason Road and Grand Mission. The preferred site is an undeveloped site and currently owned by Fort Bend County. The site offers access with frontage on Westpark/FM 1093. The rectangular shaped site can easily accommodate the necessary parking requirements and on-site bus operations and maneuvering. There do not appear to be any major environmental or land use issues to address. The site is sufficiently sized to allow for shared use or future expansion. The back of the site is adjacent to a levee where a future hike and bike trail is proposed. The Park and Ride site provides the opportunity to connect the trail to facility and allow for multimodal use of the site.

PROCEDURES

Fort Bend County is committed to a policy of non-discrimination in the conduct of its business, including the Title VI responsibility to deliver equitable and accessible public transportation services. The Public Transportation Department recognizes its responsibilities to the Fort Bend County community in which it operates and to the society, it serves. The Public Transportation Department will utilize its best efforts to assure that no person shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under the Fort Bend County program of transit service delivery and related benefits. Further, the Public Transportation Department will utilize best efforts to provide equitable and accessible public transportation services to persons of low income or limited English proficiency. For a complete copy of the Fort Bend County Title VI Statement of Policy for Public Transportation, please visit www.FBCTransit.org.

The responsibility for carrying out Fort Bend County's commitment to Title VI responsibilities rests with the Director of Public Transportation. All managers, supervisors, and employees in the Public Transportation Department share in the responsibility for making the Title VI Program a success.

The Civil Rights Officer will review and investigate every complaint promptly. Reasonable measures will be undertaken to preserve any information that is confidential. At a minimum, the Civil Rights Officer will:

- Identify and review all relevant documents, practices and procedures;
- Identify and interview persons with knowledge of the Title VI violation, i.e., the person making the complaint; witnesses or anyone identified by the Complainant; anyone who may have been subject to similar activity, or anyone with relevant information.

Once the investigation has been completed, the Civil Rights Officer will decide the validity of the complaint and what, if any, remedial actions will be taken to address the complainant's concerns. If a Title VI violation is found to exist, remedial steps as appropriate and necessary will be taken immediately. The Complainant will also receive a final report together with any remedial steps. The investigation process and final report should take no longer than twenty-five (25) business days.

The Civil Rights Officer shall maintain a log of Title VI complaints received from this process which shall include the date the complaint was filed; a summary of the allegations; the status of the complaint; and actions taken by the Fort Bend County Department of Public Transportation in response to the complaint. Should Fort Bend County receive a Title VI complaint in the form of a formal charge or lawsuit, the complaint will be forwarded to the County Attorney.

A person may also file a complaint directly with the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) no later than 180 days after the date of the alleged discrimination:

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APPENDIX G – ADVISORY COMMITTEE MEMBERSHIP

Fort Bend County Public Transportation Advisory Committee

Purpose

The purpose of the Fort Bend County Transit Advisory Committee is to challenge the Department to be more sensitive to the consumers and become more aware of service improvements the department may want to consider by committee members viewpoints of minority, low-income, and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) populations as well as older adults and persons with limited mobility.

The Advisory Committee reviews and provides recommendations to the Transit Department regarding policies, procedures and future planning. Fort Bend County values and respects inclusivity and is committed to ensuring that members of the Advisory Committee represent individuals of different backgrounds, ethnicities, and geographic locations that make up the Fort Bend County Transit Area.

Organization and Membership

Representatives are selected from each of the four County precincts to ensure County-wide representation. Members are also selected from each of the following consumer groups: senior citizens, low income individuals, members representing different LEP populations, and persons with limited mobility. The committee will consist of 10 members. Each member will serve a 3-year term with an option to continue to serve for the following terms. Once a seat becomes vacant, Fort Bend Transit will accept applications and/or nominations to serve on the Advisory Committee. Notices indicating vacant committee seats will be advertised on the department website, transit buses, and the official newspaper of record. Requests for nominees will also be sent to agencies and stakeholders in the community such as elected officials, state legislators, environmental organizations, resident groups, civic organizations, faith-based organizations and local small businesses owners and community leaders.

Advisory Committee Responsibilities

- 1. Understand Fort Bend Transit's mission, structure, programs, strengths, and challenges.
- 2. Be an active contributing participant in the following:
 - a. Provide recommendations regarding suspensions/warnings;
 - b. Attend suspension hearings;
 - A thorough review of materials and other information pertinent to issues; careful
 consideration of options for addressing these issues; and participation in the discussion of
 these issues;
- 3. Assist with strategic planning to address future needs.
- 4. Maintain confidentiality when appropriate.

Annually, by January 30 subrecipient is also required to submit to Fort Bend County's Civil Rights Officer a Title VI Notice to the Public, including a list of locations where the notice is posted.

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INTRODUCTION

The Fort Bend County Public Transportation Department (FBCPTD) was formed in June 2005 and is governed by the Fort Bend County Commissioners Court. In 2020, Fort Bend County Public Transportation changed their name to Fort Bend Transit (FBT). FBT offers general public commuter and demand response service to the citizens of Fort Bend County. FBT understands that providing ample opportunities for the public to participate in decision making is essential to delivering transportation solutions that meet the needs of the citizens of Fort Bend County.

Fort Bend Transit is committed to providing an open and visible decision-making process and ensuring equal access for its citizens. FBT shall actively solicit the involvement of citizens in the public decision-making process, through public notification, media exposure, community outreach, community presentations, public meetings, and public hearings.

This document describes outreach strategies and procedures to ensure a proactive community outreach program. FBT staff will apply the principles and guidance set out in this document to guide its efforts to create public involvement opportunities to ensure thorough public participation in the decision-making process using the regulations and guidance provided in Federal and State law.

PURPOSE

The Public Participation Plan (PPP) is a guide for FBT's ongoing public participation activities. The purpose of this PPP is to provide guidance when seeking public input related to projects and service changes and to identify techniques and methodologies for soliciting and considering public input.

The PPP aims to offer early and continuous opportunities for the public to be involved in the decision-making process and to consider the identification of social, economic, and environmental impacts of proposed transportation decisions. It is intended as a guide on how FBT will sustain its efforts to engage community members throughout the service area. As established with our Title VI policy, this includes seeking out and considering the viewpoints of minority, low-income, and Limited English Proficiency (LEP) populations as well as older adults and persons with limited mobility in the course of conducting outreach activities.

The PPP is intended to evolve to meet the changing needs of the community. FBT may periodically review and revise these methods to incorporate new and innovative ways to involve the public in transportation decision-making processes.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

FBT is committed to a thorough and robust public participation process which employs best practices, respects and follows Federal and State law, regulations, and guidance on public participation. All comments and concerns will be considered.

The goals of the plan are to:

- Offer a variety of opportunities for the general public to engage in transit planning and decision-making activities.
- 2. Maintain traditional public notice practices established by State and Local statutes.
- Consider public input received from regional processes carried out by other entities.

The objectives of the plan are to:

- Provide general notification of meetings and forums for public input in a manner that is understandable to all populations including but not limited to low-income, minority, or LEP populations.
- 2. Include meeting materials in a manner that is understandable to all populations

including but not limited to low-income, minority, or LEP populations.

- 3. Utilize a variety of communication methods to capture public input from populations which are not likely to attend or engage in public meetings.
- 4. Utilize a variety of communication methods to provide notice to the public, including new, innovative, or non-traditional means of notification.
- 5. Schedule meetings at times and locations that are convenient accessible, and welcoming to all area citizens, including but not limited to low-income, minority, or LEP communities.
- 6. Hold meetings in locations near planned projects to ensure those most likely to be impacted have opportunities for input.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION REQUIREMENTS

Major Service and Fare Changes

Fort Bend Transit defines a major service change as a 25 percent reduction or increase of service hours of routes currently in operation and funded by the Federal Transit Administration. A fare change occurs if the amount of fares increases or decreases.

At a minimum, FBT will advertise a notice of public comment in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County. An opportunity to submit comments on proposed fare increases or major service changes will be provided with a comment period of at least 30 calendar days from the date the advertisement is published. The notice will include a description of the proposed changes, information on how to submit comments along with the office contact information.

A public meeting is not mandatory; however, an opportunity for a public meeting in order to solicit comment will be provided upon written request. The written request must be received within the thirty (30) calendar day comment period. If a public meeting is requested, a notice of public meeting will be posted in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County at least one week prior to the meeting. The notice will include the time, date, and location of the public meeting.

Comments received will be compiled and considered prior to finalizing recommendations and final changes will be made available to the public. If changes to the proposed schedule are made based on the results of the public comment, the changes will be drafted and announced by public notice. If no changes are made as a result of the public comment and/or public meeting, the proposed changes will be considered final.

Federal, State, County, and Local Funding

Prior to 2014, recipients were able to rely on the TIP development process and public outreach of the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) to satisfy the individual and/or joint responsibilities for public participation. This related to the development of program of projects under Section 5307 and other formula programs which have the same statutory grant requirements (5310, 5339, etc.). The requirements have since changed, as

stated in FTA Circular 9030.1E, and as a recipient of federal funds, FBT is required to

request public comment on the funding allocated.

At a minimum, FBT will advertise a notice of public comment in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County. An opportunity to submit comments on Federal and State funding will be provided with a comment period of at least 14 calendar days from the date the advertisement is published. The notice will include a description of the project(s), project cost, Federal, State or Local share, information on how to submit comments along with the office contact information.

A public hearing is not mandatory; however, an opportunity for a public hearing in order to solicit comment will be provided upon written request. The written request must be received within the fourteen (14) calendar day comment period. If a public hearing is requested, a notice of public hearing will be posted in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County at least one week prior to the meeting. The notice will include the time, date, and location of the public meeting.

As a sub-recipient of federal funding from Houston METRO, FBCPT projects are included during METRO's public input process. FBT also places all funding acceptance or budgetary amendments on Fort Bend County Commissioner's Court for action by the Court. Commissioner's Court meeting notices and agendas are advertised in the County's newspaper of record and on the county website. Each Commissioner's Court meeting provides an opportunity for public comment.

Fort Bend Transit participates in the County's annual process for approving departmental budgets. FBT's budget includes revenues from Federal, State, and Local funding sources which are listed in the County Budget document. A budget hearing is provided for the purposes of receiving comments. The time, date, and location of the hearing will be published in the county newspaper of record.

Comments received will be compiled and considered prior to finalizing funds and/or budgets. Final changes will be made available to the public. If no changes are made as a result of the public comment and/or public hearing, the proposed funds and/or budgets will be considered final.

Capital Purchases and Improvements

Capital purchases such as buses, furniture, and equipment are included in the Federal, State, County, and Local funding budgets. Comments regarding these purchases will be received as part of the public comment for Federal, State, County, and Local funding.

New Capital Improvements such as facilities, terminals, park and ride sites, and maintenance and administration buildings are also included in the Federal, State, and County, and Local funding budgets. Comments regarding these purchases will be received as part of the public comment for Federal, State, County, and Local funding. In addition, at least one Public Meeting will be held for the purposes of receiving public comments on proposed capital improvements.

Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE)

Fort Bend Transit has established a Disadvantaged Business Enterprise (DBE) program in accordance with regulations of the U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT), 49 CFR Part 26. The County has received Federal financial assistance from the Department of Transportation, and as a condition of receiving this assistance, the County has signed an assurance that it will comply with 49 CFR Part 26. In complying with 49 CFR Part 26, FBCPT must establish an overall three-year goal and provide for public participation.

FBT will consult with minorities, women's and general contractor groups, community organizations, and other officials or organizations in an effort to gather information concerning DBE's. This information would include the availability of disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged businesses, the effects of discrimination on opportunities for DBEs, and a grantee's efforts to establish a level playing field for the participation of DBEs.

FBT will, at a minimum, advertise a notice of public comment announcing the proposed overall three-year goal in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County. The County may also utilize general circulation media and available minority-focus media and trade publications, and websites. The public notice shall include the proposed goal and its rationale. An opportunity to submit comments will be provided with a comment period of at least 45 days from the date the advertisement is published. The notice will include a brief description of the goal and rationale, how to submit comments, along with office contact information. The goal and the rationale will also be made available for inspection during normal business hours at the FBT offices for a period of at least 30 days following the date of the notice.

Once FBT has completed the public participation process the goal and is rationale are submitted to the Federal Transit Administration (FTA) for final approval. FBT will begin using the overall goal on October 1st of each year, unless FTA has issued other instructions. If FBT establishes a project goal, it will begin using this goal by the time of the first solicitation for a FTA-assisted project contract. FBCPT will post the goal and its rationale on its website where it will remain throughout the three (3) year term.

Emergency, Temporary, and/or Administrative Actions

Fort Bend Transit will provide public notice of changes by advertising on the county website and placing notices in buses for service changes due to emergency conditions, road or other construction concerns, and/or other temporary situations, when possible. Other strategies such as email or direct mail to stakeholders might also be utilized.

FBT participates in the County's development of Emergency Operations and Evacuation Planning overseen by Fort Bend County's Office of Emergency Management (OEM). The OEM follows Federal, State, and Local guidelines for this process. In emergency situations, public notice falls under the responsibility of local governments. The public should monitor television, radio, and other primary media outlets for direction.

Public Participation Plan

At a minimum, FBT will advertise a notice of public comment in the newspaper of record for Fort Bend County for initial adoption of the Public Participation Plan (PPP). An opportunity to submit comments on will be provided with a comment period of at least 45 calendar days from the date the advertisement is published. The notice will include a description of the information on how to submit comments along with the office contact information. Comments received will be compiled and considered prior to finalizing the plan. Final changes will be made available to the public. If no changes are made as a result of the public comment, the proposed plan will be considered final. Once the PPP is adopted, any changes shall also include a forty-five (45) calendar day comment period.

FBT also refers to the Transportation Advisory Committee, consisting of community stakeholders, to garner input on operational policies affecting passenger services. Policies are developed with the input of the committee but not formalized or implemented until public comment is received. Input from the committee is sought for the initial creation of policies and/or procedures as well as changes to policies such as the Passenger Guidelines and other policy documents or concerns in which the direct provision of transportation service is affected.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION METHODS

Public Notice

At a minimum, a notice of public comment will be placed in the official newspaper of record for Fort Bend County. FBT may also choose to use one or more of the following methods:

- Advertise notices on county website.
- 2. Distribute electronic and/or physical copies of notices for public input.
- Advertise on FBT's social media platforms.
- 4. Advertise notices on buses and/or at regular bus stops.
- Advertise notices to appropriate local Hispanic, African-American, and Asian publication, and local newspapers advertising public meetings and requests for comments.
- 6. Advertise notices on websites of other public or private agencies.
- Advertise notices on signs or billboards (electronic and traditional messaging signs, boards or other displays).
- 8. Place notices in public areas, community agency locations, on area bulletin boards, or in area private and public buildings as allowed.
- Advertise notices on the radio, television, magazine or other advertising media outlets.
- 10. Email notices to agencies and stakeholders in the community such as elected officials, state legislators, environmental organizations, resident groups, civic organizations, and businesses with interest in a project or who represent the public

population of riders.

Broadcast public service announcements.

Public Meetings

Public Meetings are an informal public input process open to the public and informational in content. Public meetings are generally held near planned facility locations, at activity or community centers, or during other community events.

Attendees will have the opportunity to provide comment directly to the conducting body, leave written comments, or are directed to a website designed to gather comments. Detailed information, graphics, story boards, and/or presentations are used to provide background information on the item being proposed.

Public Hearings

Public hearings are a formal public input process open to the public. These hearings are recorded live and transcripts or minutes are made available to the public in a timely fashion. Public Hearings are generally held near planned facility locations, at activity or community centers, or during other community events.

Attendees will have the opportunity to provide comments or submit them in writing during the public hearing. Commenters are generally limited to a 3-minute presentation and no feedback is allowed from the conducting body during the public hearing process.

At the beginning of each regularly scheduled Fort Bend County Commissioner's Court, an opportunity for public input is provided on any and all agenda items. FBT accepts all comments received on Departmental actions undertaken by the Commissioner's Court as part of its regularly scheduled meeting agenda.

Participation in Public Participation Programs of other Agencies

As a recipient and sub-recipient of federal funding, FBT's Program of Projects (POP) is included within the Houston Galveston Area Council's (H-GAC's) Transportation Improvement Plan (TIP) and Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). Their public notification provides opportunities for public meetings with a comment period of not less than 30 days. Additional opportunities for public review are provided informally throughout the TIP development process. As a sub-recipient of federal funding from Houston METRO, FBCPT's projects related to these funds are included in METRO's public input processes.

FBCPT often partners with other local governments and organizations. These entities provide their own programs and offer interested parties' opportunities to address concerns and receive comments.

Any comments obtained through any of the above-listed processes will be considered.

Other

FBT may also participate in public input processes hosted by other entities either by providing funding or locations, additional advertising or promotions, materials, and/or by

attending these events to provide additional information or to receive or address comments related to its projects.

FBT may also use additional outreach methods not specifically listed such as social media notices, text messaging, bulk mailers, etc.

TRANSLATION AND SPECIAL ACCOMMODATION SERVICES

FBT will hold all community meetings or public hearings in locations easily accessible to the public. Reasonable accommodations will be provided for persons attending meetings or functions. Requests from persons needing special accommodations should contact the Transit Office during business hours and should be received three (3) business days prior to a function.

Public meetings, hearings, etc. will be conducted in English. Requests for language interpreters or other special communication needs should be made at least three (3) business days prior to a function.

Vital documents will be translated in the languages that meet the Limited English Proficient (LEP) Safe Harbor threshold and will be available to the public. For requests for translations in a language not identified under the Safe Harbor threshold, please contact the Transit Office during business hours and allow three (3) to five (5) days to process the request.

CUSTOMER SERVICE

Fort Bend Transit welcomes your comments and complaints. We are committed to using passenger feedback as a tool to improve our quality of service. If you experience any dissatisfaction with the service and wish to file a complaint, you can call our office and our staff will take a verbal complaint.
