# FIRST AMENDMENT TO INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN FORT BEND COUNTY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT HOUSTON ON BEHALF OF ITS SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH

THIS FIRST AMENDMENT, is made and entered into by and between Fort Bend County (hereinafter "County"), a body corporate and politic under the laws of the State of Texas, and The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, on behalf of its School of Public Health ("UTHealth"), a state agency and an institution of higher education under the laws of the State of Texas.

WHEREAS, the parties executed and accepted that certain INTERLOCAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN FORT BEND COUNTY AND THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS HEALTH SCIENCE CENTER AT HOUSTON ON BEHALF OF ITS SCHOOL OF PUBLIC HEALTH on or around November 19, 2020, which is incorporated by reference (hereinafter "Agreement"); and

WHEREAS, the Parties desire to extend the term of the Agreement in order to continue services.

## **NOW, THEREFORE,** the Parties do mutually agree as follows:

- I. The Parties agree to continue services under the Agreement through March 31, 2023, unless terminated sooner as provided for in the Agreement. Terms, conditions, pricing, additional renewal periods and termination shall remain the same, except as noted herein.
- II. For the period of time covered by this First Amendment, UT-Health shall perform Services as identified in, and in accordance with, the attached and incorporated Exhibit B.
- III. The Maximum Compensation payable to Contractor for all Services rendered is hereby increased to an amount not to exceed calculated as follows:

Under the original Agreement:	\$122,757.00
Under this First Amendment, an additional:	\$125,000.00
TOTAL of all funds:	\$247,757.00

- IV. In the event of conflict, the most recently executed document shall prevail with regard to the conflict.
- V. Except as provided herein, all terms and conditions of the Agreement shall remain unchanged.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the Parties hereto have signed or have caused their respective names to be signed to multiple counterparts to be effective on the date signed by the final party.

Dear Hon. KP George,

Thank you for the opportunity to serve the residents of Fort Bend County for the past year and a half. Me and my colleagues at the UTHealth School of Public Health are honored to be able to continue to assist Fort Bend County and make a positive impact during this pandemic via advanced analytics that help inform the leadership within the County.

The goal of the joint FBC/UTSPH public health surveillance/analytics core is to support science-based public health action to advance population health and health equity in Fort Bend County. The UTSPH surveillance core will work in collaboration with FBC experts to advance analytics and strengthen public health infrastructure. Procedures and metrics developed will be used to monitor health indicators in real or near real time, allowing continuous identification of population subgroups with disproportionate disease burden

Analysis goals and objectives will be directed by UTSPH and FBC leadership, which will meet regularly to guide the analytical work. A joint 'priority' document will be created and updated to reflect the priorities of the joint FBC/UTSPH analytical goals consistent with the funds allotted. Specific areas of analysis include, but are not limited to:

- Conduct ongoing monitoring and surveillance analytics of COVID-19 infections, hospitalization, testing uptake, and vaccinations
- Conduct geospatial analysis to allow identification of priority communities disproportionally affected by select poor health outcomes
- Providing expertise to support chronic disease surveillance, disaster surveillance, Community Health Assessment, and wastewater surveillance.
- Support health equity outreach activities including providing relevant materials and outreach education resources as well as possible collaboration on COVID-19 vaccination events.

In addition, if applicable, UTSPH will provide analytical capacity and support to help with the After Action Report for COVID-19. Data analyses are limited to datasets available to UTHealth.
