# Background of The Center for Domestic Preparedness

FEMA Center for Domestic Preparedness

The Center for Domestic Preparedness provides advanced, all-hazards training to approximately 50,000 emergency responders annually from state, local, tribal, and territorial governments, as well as the federal government, foreign governments, and private entities, as available. The scope of training includes preparedness, protection, and response.

Since it opened its doors in 1998, the CDP has trained more than 1.3 million responders.

Responders in 17 different disciplines – Emergency Management, Emergency Medical Services, Fire Service, Governmental Administrative, Hazardous Materials, Healthcare, Law Enforcement, Public Health, Public Safety Communications, Public Works, Agriculture, Education, Citizen/Community Volunteer, Information Technology, Security and Safety, Search and Rescue, and Transportation – train at the CDP.

The responders come from all 50 states and territories, as well as a number of foreign countries.

#### The CDP Experience

The CDP provides training most responders cannot get at their home agencies.

At its Chemical, Ordnance, Biological, and Radiological Training Facility (COBRATF), the CDP offers the only program in the nation featuring civilian training exercises which use toxic chemical agents and biological materials (i.e. Sarin, VX, anthrax and ricin). The advanced hands-on training enables responders to respond effectively to real-world incidents involving chemical, biological, explosive, radiological, and other hazardous materials.

Training at the CDP's Advanced Responder Training Complex (ARTC) prepares responders to deal with a wide range of man-made and natural hazards in settings commonplace in communities across the nation. Among other things, the ARTC has an industrial park, a mock subway station, and a simulated street scene with offices, businesses and warehouses.

The Noble Training Facility at the CDP is the only hospital facility in the United States dedicated solely to training hospital and healthcare professionals in disaster preparedness and response. The facility includes classrooms, exercise and simulation areas, an emergency operations center, emergency department, clinical ward, and an isolation ward for 'patients' with highly infectious diseases.

In addition, responders earn Continuing Education Units (CEUs) for completing CDP courses. Many responders are required by their departments to earn a designated amount of CEUs each year.

Further, the CDP offers the exclusive opportunity to combine state, local, tribal and territorial responders with those from other departments and agencies to train jointly.

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# Hazardous Materials Technologies: Sampling, Monitoring, and Detection

HT PER-261 · 40 Contact Hours

The Hazardous Materials Technologies: Sampling, Monitoring, and Detection (HT) course is an enhanced version of the course previously known as "Hazardous Materials for CBRNE Incidents (HT)."

#### Overview

Hazardous Materials Technologies: Sampling, Monitoring, and Detection is a demanding five-day course that challenges the hazardous materials (HAZMAT) technician with an extensive hands-on training experience. The technician will demonstrate learned skills in response actions to a chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear or explosive (CBRNE) weapons of mass destruction incident in both the Center's outdoor Northville training complex and the Nation's only toxic chemical-agent training facility dedicated solely to emergency responders, the Chemical, Ordnance, Biological, and Radiological (COBRA) Training Facility.

Below are some, but not all, of the critical skill sets learned during this training program:

- · Select chemical sampling technology.
- · Select biological sampling technology.
- · Select radiological monitoring technology.

- · Perform hazardous materials operations in various levels of personal protective equipment.
- · Perform bulk and swab sample collections.

NOTE: Students may still register for training, however, the toxic agent training portion of the course which is normally offered, will not be included in this course until OCT 2022, due to renovation of the COBRA training bays and venue development.

#### Target Audience

This course is specifically designed for hazardous materials technicians (29 CFR 1920.120). This course is also open to Hazardous Materials Technicians within private industry. This is not the prerequisite course for attendance to the Hazardous Devices School in Huntsville, AL (Please see HMT).

#### Prerequisites and Requirements

To be eligible for the course, the student must successfully complete the following courses:

- IS-100.b, Introduction to the Incident Command System, IS-100, or any of the available ICS-100 series;
- IS-200.b, ICS for Single Resources and Initial Action Incidents, IS-200, or any of the available ICS-200 series;
- . 10 700 h National Incident Management System An Introduction 10 700, and

#### The student should also


- · Currently serve as a hazardous materials technician.
- Have received HAZMAT training that meets or exceeds the requirements for technician-level training as outlined in OSHA 29 C.F.R. 1910.120(q)(6)(iii).
- Be physically and mentally capable of completing all course learning activities.
