### **Narrative Information**

#### Overview

The purpose of the Homeland Security Grant Program (HSGP) is to support state and local efforts to prevent terrorism and other catastrophic events and to prepare the Nation for the threats and hazards that pose the greatest risk to the security of the United States. HSGP provides funding to implement investments that build, sustain, and deliver the 32 core capabilities essential to achieving the National Preparedness Goal (the Goal) of a secure and resilient Nation. The building, sustainment, and delivery of these core capabilities are not exclusive to any single level of government, organization, or community, but rather, require the combined effort of the whole community. HSGP supports core capabilities across the five mission areas of Prevention, Protection, Mitigation, Response, and Recovery based on allowable costs.

### **Primary Mission and Purpose**

**State Homeland Security Program (SHSP)**: Supports state, Tribal and local preparedness activities that address high-priority preparedness gaps across all core capabilities where a nexus to terrorism exists. All investments must be consistent with capability targets set during the Threat and Hazard Identification and Risk Assessment (THIRA) process, and gaps identified in the State Preparedness Report (SPR).

### **Project Summary:**

Briefly summarize the project, including proposed activities and intended impact.

: This project aims to enhance communication effectiveness and operational efficiency by replacing outdated patrol radios within our department. Our current radio equipment, which has exceeded its recommended service life, presents reliability issues and compromises officer safety and response times. The APX 6000 radios are end-of-life and not supported.

#### **Problem Statement:**

Our current deputy patrol radios are outdated and pose significant issues, hazards, and threats to our operational effectiveness and officer safety and impose liabilities during terrorism incident response and recovery. The radios frequently experience signal dropouts, poor reception, and limited range, which can hinder communication during terrorism calls & related critical incidents. This compromises our ability to respond promptly and coordinate effectively in serving the needs of the county in these calls. According to the Preparedness Review (SPR) Stakeholder Report, Pg.# 36 our current communication infrastructure falls short of meeting the demands of modern community and emergency response. The report underscores the critical need for reliable, secure, and interoperable communication systems to effectively address real and potential threats in the community. To address these shortcomings, we propose replacing our patrol radios with advanced digital models APX6000-BN series radios. This upgrade aims to mitigate risks and significantly enhance our preparedness and response capabilities. The new radios will provide improved signal strength, secure encrypted communication, and compatibility with other emergency services, ensuring seamless coordination during dispatch calls, deputy response times and responding to emergencies.

#### **Existing Capability Levels:**

Describe the existing capability levels, including resources that are currently in place to support this project prior to the use of grant funds.

The Fort Bend County Sheriff's Office (FBCSO), along with law enforcement agencies from Sugar Land, Rosenberg, Missouri City, and Stafford, is committed to providing exceptional protection and service to the Fort Bend community. The FBCSO supports the entire county, which includes 10 municipalities with police departments, 7 school districts that include 277 schools, 176 public schools and 101 private schools, and six colleges and universities enrolling 250,000 students annually. Additionally, we extend our support to Harris, Brazoria, and Wharton Counties. To increase the region's ability to respond effectively, it is crucial to equip our patrol officers with upto-date patrol radios. This project aims to address current capability gaps by providing reliable,

secure, and interoperable communication systems. These advanced digital radios will enhance our overall preparedness and response capabilities by offering improved signal strength, encryption for secure communication, and compatibility with other emergency services. Up-to-date radios are essential to support incident communication needs from both a technical and operational standpoint, ensuring seamless coordination during deputy calls and emergencies.

### Capability Gaps:

As referenced in the 2024 UASI SPR (page 36): 26.3.1 The region needs additional P25 radios, spare batteries & infrastructure per gap analysis. The FBC patrol division currently has radios that are in need of being replaced and the need of these items is critical to ensure each member of our team is equipped with upgraded technology and provided with increased safety measures during daily operations calls and responses. We have on-scene, law enforcement, and protection capabilities, and this project seeks to increase the region's ability to respond by equipping the Team with current, equipment for consistency across the region and to buy down any capability gaps. This equipment will significantly enhance the operational capabilities of the Fort Bend County Sheriff's deputies, ensuring that all deputies can effectively respond to calls, emergencies, and emerging threats and safeguard the public in the Houston-UASI region. Through this initiative, the FBCSO deputies will have the necessary tools to handle all communication efforts throughout the entire county.

### **Impact Statement:**

The impact of this project is that it will ensure secure, encrypted communication within our jurisdictions and across multiple jurisdictions/agencies during terroristic incidents and daily operational call and critical incident responses. In upgrading the required equipment, the FBCSO will be better equipped to prevent further issues and respond to all calls in the community and terroristic threats of any kind, as well as provide a high level of protection and improved response in a high-risk urban area. During daily deployment of the patrol team, communication must be effective to ensure a coordinated, sometimes complex response with other law enforcement agencies. Effective communications also enhances officer safety and is vital to sharing intelligence and information across jurisdictions.

Additionally, the general population of the county, including residents, businesses, and visitors, will benefit from improved public safety and faster emergency response times, particularly as they gather for large-scale events and during times when they are targets for terrorist activity as they attempt mass casualties and fear. The enhanced communication capabilities provided by the new patrol radios will enable our officers to respond more efficiently to terrorism incidents, coordinate better with other emergency services, and ensure a higher level of safety and security for everyone within the jurisdiction. This project is especially crucial in addressing the growing population in Fort Bend County and threats of emergency situations that require seamless and secure communication.
