GRANT AGREEMENT GENERAL TERMS AND CONDITIONS

Definitions: For purposes of these Terms and Conditions, the "Department" is also known as the "State" and the "prospective primary participant" and the "Subgrantee" is also known as the "Subrecipient" and "prospective lower tier participant"

ARTICLE 1. COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS

The Subgrantee shall comply with all federal, state, and local laws, statutes, codes, ordinances, rules and regulations, and the orders and decrees of any courts or administrative bodies or tribunals in any matter affecting the performance of this agreement, including, without limitation, workers' compensation laws, minimum and maximum salary and wage statutes and regulations, nondiscrimination laws and regulations, and licensing laws and regulations. When required, the Subgrantee shall furnish the Department with satisfactory proof of compliance.

ARTICLE 2. STANDARD ASSURANCES

The Subgrantee assures and certifies that it will comply with the regulations, policies, guidelines, and requirements, including 2 CFR, Part 200; and the Department's Behavioral Traffic Safety Program Manual, as they relate to the application, acceptance, and use of federal or state funds for this project. Also, the Subgrantee assures and certifies that:

- A. It possesses legal authority to apply for the grant; and that a resolution, motion, or similar action has been duly adopted or passed as an official act of the applicant's governing body, authorizing the filing of the application, including all understandings and assurances contained in the application, and directing and authorizing the person identified as the official representative of the applicant to act in connection with the application and to provide any additional information that may be required.
- B. It and its subcontractors will comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (Public Law 88-352), as amended, and in accordance with that Act, no person shall discriminate, on the grounds of race, color, sex, national origin, age, religion, or disability.
- C. It will comply with requirements of the provisions of the Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisitions Act of 1970, as amended; 42 USC (United States Code) §§4601 et seq.; and United States Department of Transportation (USDOT) regulations, "Uniform Relocation and Real Property Acquisition for Federal and Federally Assisted Programs," 49 CFR, Part 24, which provide for fair and equitable treatment of persons displaced as a result of federal and federally assisted programs.
- D. Political activity (Hatch Act) (applies to subrecipients as well as States). The State will comply with provisions of the Hatch Act (5 U.S.C. 1501-1508) which limits the political activities of employees whose principal employment activities are funded in whole or in part with Federal funds.
- E. It will comply with the federal Fair Labor Standards Act's minimum wage and overtime requirements for employees performing project work.

- F. It will establish safeguards to prohibit employees from using their positions for a purpose that is or gives the appearance of being motivated by a desire for private gain for themselves or others, particularly those with whom they have family, business, or other ties.
- G. It will give the Department the access to and the right to examine all records, books, papers, or documents related to this Grant Agreement.
- H. It will comply with all requirements imposed by the Department concerning special requirements of law, program requirements, and other administrative requirements.
- I. It recognizes that many federal and state laws imposing environmental and resource conservation requirements may apply to this Grant Agreement. Some, but not all, of the major federal laws that may affect the project include: the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended, 42 USC §§4321 et seq.; the Clean Air Act, as amended, 42 USC §§7401 et seq. and sections of 29 USC; the Federal Water Pollution Control Act, as amended, 33 USC §§1251 et seq.; the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, as amended, 42 USC §§6901 et seq.; and the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act, as amended, 42 USC §§9601 et seq. The Subgrantee also recognizes that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, USDOT, and other federal agencies have issued, and in the future are expected to issue, regulations, guidelines, standards, orders, directives, or other requirements that may affect this Project. Thus, it agrees to comply, and assures the compliance of each contractor and each subcontractor, with any federal requirements that the federal government may now or in the future promulgate.
- J. It will comply with the flood insurance purchase requirements of Section 102(a) of the Flood Disaster Protection Act of 1973, 42 USC §4012a(a). Section 102(a) requires, on and after March 2, 1975, the purchase of flood insurance in communities where that insurance is available as a condition for the receipt of any federal financial assistance for construction or acquisition purposes for use in any area that has been identified by the Secretary of the Department of Housing and Urban Development as an area having special flood hazards. The phrase "federal financial assistance" includes any form of loan, grant, guaranty, insurance payment, rebate, subsidy, disaster assistance loan or grant, or any form of direct or indirect federal assistance.
- K. It will assist the Department in its compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 as amended (16 USC 470 et seq.), Executive Order 11593, and the Antiquities Code of Texas (National Resources Code, Chapter 191).
- L. It will comply with Chapter 573 of the Texas Government Code by ensuring that no officer, employee, or member of the Subgrantee's governing board or the Subgrantee's subcontractors shall vote or confirm the employment of any person related within the second degree of affinity or third degree by consanguinity to any member of the governing body or to any other officer or employee authorized to employ or supervise that person. This prohibition shall not apply to the employment of a person described in Section 573.062 of the Texas Government Code.
- M. It will ensure that all information collected, assembled, or maintained by the applicant relative to this project shall be available to the public during normal business hours in compliance with Chapter 552 of the Texas Government Code, unless otherwise expressly

provided by law.

- N. If applicable, it will comply with Chapter 551 of the Texas Government Code, which requires all regular, special, or called meetings of governmental bodies to be open to the public, except as otherwise provided by law or specifically permitted in the Texas Constitution.

ARTICLE 3. COMPENSATION

A. The method of payment for this agreement will be based on actual costs incurred up to and not to exceed the limits specified in the Project Budget. The amount included in a Project Budget category will be deemed to be an estimate only and a higher amount can be reimbursed, subject to the conditions specified in paragraph B of this Article. If the Project Budget specifies that costs are based on a specific rate, per-unit cost, or other method of payment, reimbursement will be based on the specified method.

B. All payments will be made in accordance with the Project Budget.

1. The Subgrantee's expenditures may overrun a budget category (I, II, or III) in the approved Project Budget without a grant (budget) amendment, as long as the overrun does not exceed a total of five (5) percent of the maximum amount eligible for reimbursement (TxDOT) in the attached Project Budget for the current fiscal year. This overrun must be offset by an equivalent underrun elsewhere in the Project Budget.
2. An increase to a salary amount stated in the budget is not considered an overrun. An underrun elsewhere in the budget may not be used to fund an increase to a stated salary amount.
3. If the overrun is five (5) percent or less, the Subgrantee must provide written notification to the Department, through the TxDOT Electronic Grants Management System (eGrants), prior to the Request for Reimbursement being approved. The notification must indicate the amount, the percent over, and the specific reason(s) for the overrun.
4. Any overrun of more than five (5) percent of the amount eligible for reimbursement (TxDOT) in the attached Project Budget requires an amendment of this Grant Agreement.
5. The maximum amount eligible for reimbursement shall not be increased above the Grand Total TxDOT Amount in the approved Project Budget, unless this Grant Agreement is amended, as described in Article 5 of this agreement.
6. For Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) grants only: In the Project Budget, Subgrantees are not allowed to use underrun funds from the TxDOT amount of (100) Salaries, Subcategories A, "Enforcement," or B, "PI&E Activities," to exceed the TxDOT amount listed in Subcategory C, "Other." Also, Subgrantees are not allowed to use underrun funds from the TxDOT amount of (100) Salaries, Subcategories A, "Enforcement," or C, "Other," to exceed the TxDOT amount listed in Subcategory B, "PI&E Activities." The TxDOT amount for Subcategory B, "PI&E Activities," or C, "Other," can only be exceeded within the five (5) percent flexibility, with underrun funds from Budget Categories II or III.

C. To be eligible for reimbursement under this agreement, a cost must be incurred in

accordance with the Project Budget, within the time frame specified in the Grant Period of this Grant Agreement, attributable to work covered by this agreement, and which has been completed in a manner satisfactory and acceptable to the Department.

- D. Federal or TxDOT funds cannot supplant (replace) funds from any other sources. The term "supplanting," refers to the use of federal or TxDOT funds to support personnel or an activity already supported by local or state funds.
- E. Payment of costs incurred under this agreement is further governed by the cost principles outlined in 2 CFR Part 200.
- F. The Subgrantee agrees to submit monthly Requests for Reimbursement, as designated in this Grant Agreement, within thirty (30) days after the end of the billing period. The Request for Reimbursement and appropriate supporting documentation must be submitted through eGrants.
- G. The Subgrantee agrees to submit the final Request for Reimbursement under this agreement within forty-five (45) days of the end of the grant period.
- H. Payments are contingent upon the availability of appropriated funds.
- I. Project agreements supported with federal or TxDOT funds are limited to the length of this Grant Period specified in this Grant Agreement. If the Department determines that the project has demonstrated merit or has potential long-range benefits, the Subgrantee may apply for funding assistance beyond the initial agreement period.

Preference for funding will be given to projects based on demonstrated performance history.

ARTICLE 4. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

Payment of costs incurred under this agreement is contingent upon the availability of funds. If at any time during this Grant Period, the Department determines that there is insufficient funding to continue the project, the Department shall notify the Subgrantee, giving notice of intent to terminate this agreement, as specified in Article 11 of this agreement. If at the end of a federal fiscal year, the Department determines that there is sufficient funding and performance to continue the project, the Department may notify the Subgrantee to continue this agreement.

ARTICLE 5. AMENDMENTS

This agreement may be amended prior to its expiration by mutual written consent of both parties, utilizing the Grant Agreement Amendment in eGrants. Any amendment must be executed by the parties within the Grant Period, as specified in this Grant Agreement.

ARTICLE 6. ADDITIONAL WORK AND CHANGES IN WORK

- A. If the Subgrantee is of the opinion that any assigned work is beyond the scope of this agreement and constitutes additional work, the Subgrantee shall promptly notify the Department in writing through eGrants. If the Department finds that such work does constitute additional work, the Department shall advise the Subgrantee and a written amendment to this agreement will be executed according to Article 5, Amendments, to provide compensation for doing this work on the same basis as the original work. If

performance of the additional work will cause the maximum amount payable to be exceeded, the work will not be performed before a written grant amendment is executed.

- B. If the Subgrantee has submitted work in accordance with the terms of this agreement but the Department requests changes to the completed work or parts of the work which involve changes to the original scope of services or character of work under this agreement, the Subgrantee shall make those revisions as requested and directed by the Department. This will be considered as additional work and will be paid for as specified in this Article.
- C. If the Subgrantee submits work that does not comply with the terms of this agreement, the Department shall instruct the Subgrantee to make any revisions that are necessary to bring the work into compliance with this agreement. No additional compensation shall be paid for this work.
- D. The Subgrantee shall make revisions to the work authorized in this agreement that are necessary to correct errors or omissions, when required to do so by the Department. No additional compensation shall be paid for this work.
- E. The Department shall not be responsible for actions by the Subgrantee or any costs incurred by the Subgrantee relating to additional work not directly associated with or prior to the execution of an amendment.

ARTICLE 7. REPORTING AND MONITORING

- A. Not later than thirty (30) days after the end of each reporting period, the Subgrantee shall submit a performance report through eGrants. Reporting periods vary by project duration and are defined as follows:
 - 1. For short term projects, the reporting period is the duration of the project. Subgrantee shall submit a performance report within 30 days of project completion.
 - 2. For longer projects, the reporting period is monthly. Subgrantee shall submit a performance report within 30 days of the completion of each project month and within 30 days of project completion.
 - 3. For Selective Traffic Enforcement Program (STEP) Wave projects, the reporting period is each billing cycle. Subgrantee shall submit a performance report within 30 days of the completion of each billing cycle.
- B. The performance report will include, as a minimum: (1) a comparison of actual accomplishments to the objectives established for the period, (2) reasons why established objectives and performance measures were not met, if appropriate, and (3) other pertinent information, including, when appropriate, an analysis and explanation of cost underruns, overruns, or high unit costs.
- C. The Subgrantee shall promptly advise the Department in writing, through eGrants, of events that will have a significant impact upon this agreement, including:
 - 1. Problems, delays, or adverse conditions, including a change of project director or other changes in Subgrantee personnel, that will materially affect the ability to attain objectives and performance measures, prevent the meeting of time schedules and objectives, or preclude the attainment of project objectives or performance measures by the established time periods. This disclosure shall be accompanied by a statement

by the established time periods. This disclosure shall be accompanied by a statement of the action taken or contemplated and any Department or federal assistance needed to resolve the situation.

2. Favorable developments or events that enable meeting time schedules and objectives sooner than anticipated or achieving greater performance measure output than originally projected.

ARTICLE 8. RECORDS

The Subgrantee agrees to maintain all reports, documents, papers, accounting records, books, and other evidence pertaining to costs incurred and work performed under this agreement (called the "Records"), and shall make the Records available at its office for the time period authorized within the Grant Period, as specified in this Grant Agreement. The Subgrantee further agrees to retain the Records for four (4) years from the date of final payment under this agreement, until completion of all audits, or until pending litigation has been completely and fully resolved, whichever occurs last.

Duly authorized representatives of the Department, the USDOT, the Office of the Inspector General, Texas State Auditor, and the Comptroller General shall have access to the Records. This right of access is not limited to the four (4) year period but shall last as long as the Records are retained.

ARTICLE 9. INDEMNIFICATION

- A. To the extent permitted by law, the Subgrantee, if other than a government entity, shall indemnify, hold, and save harmless the Department and its officers and employees from all claims and liability due to the acts or omissions of the Subgrantee, its agents, or employees. The Subgrantee also agrees, to the extent permitted by law, to indemnify, hold, and save harmless the Department from any and all expenses, including but not limited to attorney fees, all court costs and awards for damages incurred by the Department in litigation or otherwise resisting claims or liabilities as a result of any activities of the Subgrantee, its agents, or employees.
- B. To the extent permitted by law, the Subgrantee, if other than a government entity, agrees to protect, indemnify, and save harmless the Department from and against all claims, demands, and causes of action of every kind and character brought by any employee of the Subgrantee against the Department due to personal injuries to or death of any employee resulting from any alleged negligent act, by either commission or omission on the part of the Subgrantee.
- C. If the Subgrantee is a government entity, both parties to this agreement agree that no party is an agent, servant, or employee of the other party and each party agrees it is responsible for its individual acts and deeds, as well as the acts and deeds of its contractors, employees, representatives, and agents.

ARTICLE 10. DISPUTES AND REMEDIES

This agreement supersedes any prior oral or written agreements. If a conflict arises between this agreement and the Traffic Safety Program Manual this agreement shall govern. The

the agreement and the prime safety program manual, the agreement shall govern. The Subgrantee shall be responsible for the settlement of all contractual and administrative issues arising out of procurement made by the Subgrantee in support of work under this agreement. Disputes concerning performance or payment shall be submitted to the Department for settlement, with the Executive Director or his or her designee acting as final referee.

ARTICLE 11. TERMINATION

- A. This agreement shall remain in effect until the Subgrantee has satisfactorily completed all services and obligations described in this agreement and these have been accepted by the Department, unless:
1. This agreement is terminated in writing with the mutual consent of both parties; or
 2. There is a written thirty (30) day notice by either party; or
 3. The Department determines that the performance of the project is not in the best interest of the Department and informs the Subgrantee that the project is terminated immediately.
- B. The Department shall compensate the Subgrantee for only those eligible expenses incurred during the Grant Period specified in this Grant Agreement that are directly attributable to the completed portion of the work covered by this agreement, provided that the work has been completed in a manner satisfactory and acceptable to the Department. The Subgrantee shall not incur nor be reimbursed for any new obligations after the effective date of termination.

ARTICLE 12. INSPECTION OF WORK

- A. The Department and, when federal funds are involved, the USDOT, or any of their authorized representatives, have the right at all reasonable times to inspect or otherwise evaluate the work performed or being performed under this agreement and the premises in which it is being performed.
- B. If any inspection or evaluation is made on the premises of the Subgrantee or its subcontractor, the Subgrantee shall provide and require its subcontractor to provide all reasonable facilities and assistance for the safety and convenience of the inspectors in the performance of their duties. All inspections and evaluations shall be performed in a manner that will not unduly delay the work.

ARTICLE 13. AUDIT

The state auditor may conduct an audit or investigation of any entity receiving funds from the state directly under this agreement or indirectly through a subcontract under this agreement. Acceptance of funds directly under this agreement or indirectly through a subcontract under this agreement acts as acceptance of the authority of the State Auditor, under the direction of the legislative audit committee, to conduct an audit or investigation in connection with those funds. An entity that is the subject of an audit or investigation must provide the state auditor with access to any information the state auditor considers relevant to the investigation or audit.

ARTICLE 14. SUBCONTRACTS

A subcontract in excess of \$25,000 may not be executed by the Subgrantee without prior written concurrence by the Department. Subcontracts in excess of \$25,000 shall contain all applicable terms and conditions of this agreement. No subcontract will relieve the Subgrantee of its responsibility under this agreement.

ARTICLE 15. GRATUITIES

- A. Texas Transportation Commission policy mandates that employees of the Department shall not accept any benefit, gift, or favor from any person doing business with or who, reasonably speaking, may do business with the Department under this agreement. The only exceptions allowed are ordinary business lunches and items that have received the advanced written approval of the Department's Executive Director.
- B. Any person doing business with or who reasonably speaking may do business with the Department under this agreement may not make any offer of benefits, gifts, or favors to Department employees, except as mentioned here above. Failure on the part of the Subgrantee to adhere to this policy may result in termination of this agreement.

ARTICLE 16. NONCOLLUSION

The Subgrantee warrants that it has not employed or retained any company or person, other than a bona fide employee working solely for the Subgrantee, to solicit or secure this agreement, and that it has not paid or agreed to pay any company or person, other than a bona fide employee, any fee, commission, percentage, brokerage fee, gift, or any other consideration contingent upon or resulting from the award or making of this agreement. If the Subgrantee breaches or violates this warranty, the Department shall have the right to annul this agreement without liability or, in its discretion, to deduct from the agreement price or consideration, or otherwise recover the full amount of such fee, commission, brokerage fee, contingent fee, or gift.

ARTICLE 17. CONFLICT OF INTEREST

The Subgrantee represents that it or its employees have no conflict of interest that would in any way interfere with its or its employees' performance or which in any way conflicts with the interests of the Department. The Subgrantee shall exercise reasonable care and diligence to prevent any actions or conditions that could result in a conflict with the Department's interests.

ARTICLE 18. SUBGRANTEE'S RESOURCES

- A. The Subgrantee certifies that it presently has adequate qualified personnel in its employment to perform the work required under this agreement, or will be able to obtain such personnel from sources other than the Department.
- B. All employees of the Subgrantee shall have the knowledge and experience that will enable them to perform the duties assigned to them. Any employee of the Subgrantee who, in the opinion of the Department, is incompetent or whose conduct becomes detrimental to the work, shall immediately be removed from association with the project.

- C. Unless otherwise specified, the Subgrantee shall furnish all equipment, materials, supplies, and other resources required to perform the work.

ARTICLE 19. PROCUREMENT AND PROPERTY MANAGEMENT

The Subgrantee shall establish and administer a system to procure, control, protect, preserve, use, maintain, and dispose of any property furnished to it by the Department or purchased pursuant to this agreement in accordance with its own procurement and property management procedures, provided that the procedures are not in conflict with (1) the Department's procurement and property management standards and (2) the federal procurement and property management standards provided by 2 CFR §§ 200.216, 200.310-.316, 200.318-.327.

ARTICLE 20. OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS AND INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

Upon completion or termination of this Grant Agreement, whether for cause or at the convenience of the parties, all finished or unfinished documents, data, studies, surveys, reports, maps, drawings, models, photographs, etc. prepared by the Subgrantee, and equipment and supplies purchased with grant funds shall, at the option of the Department, become the property of the Department. All sketches, photographs, calculations, and other data prepared under this agreement shall be made available, upon request, to the Department without restriction or limitation of their further use.

- A. Intellectual property consists of copyrights, patents, and any other form of intellectual property rights covering any databases, software, inventions, training manuals, systems design, or other proprietary information in any form or medium.
- B. All rights to Department. The Department shall own all of the rights (including copyrights, copyright applications, copyright renewals, and copyright extensions), title and interests in and to all data, and other information developed under this contract and versions thereof unless otherwise agreed to in writing that there will be joint ownership.
- C. All rights to Subgrantee. Classes and materials initially developed by the Subgrantee without any type of funding or resource assistance from the Department remain the Subgrantee's intellectual property. For these classes and materials, the Department payment is limited to payment for attendance at classes.

ARTICLE 21. SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

The Department and the Subgrantee each binds itself, its successors, executors, assigns, and administrators to the other party to this agreement and to the successors, executors, assigns, and administrators of the other party in respect to all covenants of this agreement. The Subgrantee shall not assign, sublet, or transfer interest and obligations in this agreement without written consent of the Department through eGrants.

ARTICLE 22. CIVIL RIGHTS COMPLIANCE

- A. Compliance with regulations: The Subgrantee shall comply with the regulations relative to nondiscrimination in federally-assisted programs of the United States Department of

Transportation (USDOT): 49 CFR, Part 21; 23 CFR, Part 200; and 41 CFR, Chapter 60, as they may be amended periodically (called the "Regulations"). The Subgrantee agrees to comply with Executive Order 11246, entitled "Equal Employment Opportunity," as amended by Executive Order 11375 and as supplemented by the U.S. Department of Labor regulations (41 CFR, Part 60).

B. Nondiscrimination: (applies to subrecipients as well as States) The State highway safety agency will comply with all Federal statutes and implementing regulations relating to nondiscrimination ("Federal Nondiscrimination Authorities"). These include but are not limited to:

- **Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964** (42 U.S.C. 2000d et seq., 78 stat. 252), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, national origin) and 49 CFR part 21;
- **The Uniform Relocation Assistance and Real Property Acquisition Policies Act of 1970**, (42 U.S.C. 4601), (prohibits unfair treatment of persons displaced or whose property has been acquired because of Federal or Federal-aid programs and projects);
- **Federal-Aid Highway Act of 1973**, (23 U.S.C. 324 et seq.), and **Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972**, as amended (20 U.S.C. 1681-1683 and 1685-1686) (prohibit discrimination on the basis of sex);
- **Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973**, (29 U.S.C. 794 et seq.), as amended, (prohibits discrimination on the basis of disability) and 49 CFR part 27;
- **The Age Discrimination Act of 1975**, as amended, (42 U.S.C. 6101 et seq.), (prohibits discrimination on the basis of age);
- **The Civil Rights Restoration Act of 1987**, (Pub. BACKGROUND

8. Have in place a written employee code of conduct that, at a minimum, addresses record retention, fraud, equal opportunity employment, sexual harassment, conflicts of interest, personal use of the entity's property, and gifts honoraria

The entity shall adopt a code of conduct that, at a minimum, addresses each element of this requirement.

PROBLEM IDENTIFICATION AND SOLUTION

I. Problem Identification

According to the US Census Bureau estimates, Fort Bend ranks 7th in population growth in Texas (population 822,779 - US Census Bureau, 2020) and experiences challenges similar to those of other communities regarding traffic safety and impaired driving. TxDOT reported 4,283 traffic fatalities statewide in 2023, down from 4,481 in 2022. Of those, 1,090 deaths were DUI-related, including 695 drivers who died while driving under the influence of alcohol. Fort Bend County reported 264 DUI crashes in 2023 (TxDOT DUI Crashes & Injuries by County Map 2023) and ranks 3rd among the 12 counties in the Greater Houston area, with Harris County ranked 1st in DUI-related crashes statewide.

Fort Bend County covers over 885 square miles, including over 437 square miles of undeveloped farmland. In 2023, the fatalities in rural areas (2,263) accounted for more than half of the state's total traffic fatalities (4,283). As over 50% of Fort Bend County is considered rural, this risk factor increases the likelihood of deaths on Fort Bend County roads.

Most alcohol-related fatalities in Fort Bend County occur between 0200 and 0259 hours. (TxDOT DUI Crashes by Hour & Day of Week 2023). Between 2021 and 2022, the number of fatal crashes and fatalities in Fort Bend County declined from 49 fatal crashes in 2021 to 37 in 2022. However, in 2023, while the number of deadly crashes decreased (41 fatal crashes) from 2022, there was a noticeable increase in the number of fatalities (44 fatalities), including nine DUI-related fatalities (up from seven deaths in 2022). In 2023, eight out of 41 fatal crashes in Fort Bend County were due to alcohol-impaired drivers (TxDOT DUI Crashes & Injuries by County 2023). Among the DUI-related fatalities, five of these deaths were alcohol-impaired drivers. These numbers ONLY include alcohol-related fatalities and not drug-impaired drivers, which reflects even higher rates.

The impaired driving problem Fort Bend County, Texas (FBC) combats is the same nationwide. In Fort Bend County, traffic safety concerns include:

Increased High Average Blood/Breath Alcohol Concentration (BAC): Fort Bend County does not have a comprehensive system to track individuals' Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) levels for all DWI filings. In 2020, FBC reported 803 DWI filings, with 29% of those filing DWI > 0.15 BAC. In 2023, 32% of 1,335 DWI cases filed charges DWI > 0.15 BAC (2023 FBC DWI Filings as of 12/31/23), resulting in Fort Bend County aligning with the statewide trend toward dangerously high average BAC.

Low Conviction Rates Due to High Refusal Rates/Lack of Blood Specimen For Proof: However, Fort Bend County is no different from other counties where the conviction rates are substantially lower when no blood specimen is collected, and officers are limited to breathalyzer results to prove intoxication. While FBC obtains specimens (via blood warrant or consent) 100% of the time during No Refusal Operations, we have not duplicated this success with cases filed outside of No Refusal Operations. Whether a refusal to give a specimen or not is collected, it becomes exponentially difficult for the officers and prosecutors to prove intoxication and obtain convictions. Both factors lead to more impaired drivers on Fort Bend roadways and fewer drivers being held accountable.

Cumbersome Process to Obtain DUI Warrants: Fort Bend County lacks a streamlined process for processing DWI-related warrants efficiently. It is common for a DUI arrest to take 3-5 hours to complete as no procedure exists outside No Refusal Operations to assist officers in collecting and preserving time-sensitive evidence, which dissipates for every minute collection is delayed. The longer it takes to obtain a

warrant and complete the blood draw, the less likely the evidence obtained will be helpful to prove intoxication.

Lack of Trained DUI Officers: Fort Bend County has few officers trained explicitly in alcohol or drug detection. Trained officers must ensure that impaired individuals are identified and taken off the road. With the few officers trained in alcohol and drug detection, a blood specimen must be obtained in every case so that evidence is not lost. Without the continued partnership with TxDOT, we cannot continue to successfully prosecute DUI offenders and remove dangerous drivers to maintain traffic safety in Fort Bend.

II. Problem Solution

Fort Bend County is in its fifth year of partnering with TxDOT through the No Refusal Program. It strives to improve evidence collection, conviction rates, training for officers, and treatment available to offenders to reduce the number of impaired drivers on Fort Bend County roads. FBC continues to work closely with the community to increase awareness through media events, press releases, and community outreach. By continuing to fund No Refusal Operations, TxDOT is an essential partner in reducing the number of DUI crashes and fatalities in Fort Bend County. This year, FBC added two additional No Refusal Operations outside traditional holiday weekends to address impaired driving around local events such as the BBQ Cook-off at Rodeo Houston and the Fort Bend County Fair opening weekend. These operations resulted in three additional DUI arrests.

FY21 was the first year Fort Bend County had a No Refusal grant and developed a DUI tracker to identify trends and compare data. While the number of arrests during No Refusal Weekends has declined since the program was implemented, overall DWI filings increased by over 49% between 2020 and 2023. These numbers include only cases filed per BAC and do not include first-time offenders, repeat offenders, or felony cases with a high BAC. Based on the DWI Warrant Tracking log, which contains dates and times for blood draw warrants issued outside No Refusal Operations, the highest number of DUI arrests occur within the last two weeks of the month (depending upon how holidays fall on the calendar). Without funding from TxDOT, FBC cannot maintain the program to address the increased numbers of impaired drivers on Fort Bend County roads and protect its citizens.

FBCDA recognized that DUI suspects refusing to provide breath or blood specimens to officers was an important issue to address to protect drivers on Fort Bend County roadways. Courts have held that obtaining a search warrant for blood is a legal form of specimen collection. To address these challenges, we have created a standardized blood draw warrant format and prosecutor training beyond the No Refusal program to address timelines. FBCDA embraces this approach to work closely with law enforcement agencies, judges, and qualified technicians to obtain search warrants and blood samples from DUI suspects refusing to provide a specimen. Utilizing this plan, FBCDA will be able to quickly and effectively obtain blood evidence and hold impaired drivers responsible in court.

FBC will continue conducting No Refusal Operations on holiday weekends (10 pm-6 am), corresponding with the deadliest hours and days of the week (TxDOT DUI Crashes by Hour & Day of the Week 2023). FBC will conduct 25 nights of No Refusal Operations in FY26 and continue to secure locations for No Refusal Operations with a separate sanitary room equipped with video equipment, a QT area, and a space to restrain non-compliant suspects. During No Refusal weekends (25 nights), prosecutors, an administrative assistant (AA), and qualified technicians (QT) work at designated locations where officers bring DUI suspects to obtain blood search warrants and make blood draws. Once drafted, officers present warrants to an available judge/magistrate in person or electronically. Once a Judge signs a warrant, the QT legally draws the blood. This streamlined process significantly reduces the time for a DUI investigation, eliminating the officer's need to locate a hospital and willing medical staff to assist, thereby keeping emergency rooms free

for those with other medical needs. Administrative Assistants (AAs) assist prosecutors and officers, copy warrants, and follow up after the operation to ensure all warrants/returns are filed correctly. All AAs are notaries and can swear to warrant affiants. They are also responsible for tracking statistics related to specimens collected, refusal and conviction rates, and updating the tracker monthly.

In FY26, FBC will work to acquire at least 100 blood search warrants or consent after initial refusal over 25 No Refusal Holiday dates. We will evaluate all DUI arrests and track rates of refusal, consensual specimens, conviction rates, and warrants executed. We will work to train law enforcement officers to be more effective in DUI enforcement and continue to encourage law enforcement participation in our No Refusal initiative by increasing patrols during the peak times to encounter impaired drivers. With TxDOT's support, this grant empowers us to improve DUI enforcement while educating the community to raise awareness of the dangers of impaired driving. By maintaining the No Refusal Program through this grant, TxDOT will support Fort Bend in the fight to eliminate impaired driving-related fatalities.

III. Project Evaluation

FBC will measure the grant's efficacy by tracking statistics and analyzing data for trends, as well as a media campaign to educate citizens about the dangers of impaired driving. Through these efforts, we aim to improve the process for obtaining blood warrants and specimens in all DUI cases by tracking the number of DUI arrests, rates of refusal, rates of consensual specimens given during DUI arrests, conviction rates, and blood warrants executed.
