





## Detention Division at Justice Center Requested





New Detention Positions at Justice Center include:

- 1 Security Control
- 1 Supervision/escorting of Immates
- 1 Relief Factor

• Three positions previously approved but were cut prior to coming online due to decreased inmate population (Exhibit D)

• 3 Correctional Officers

(1 Security Control, 1 Supervision/escorting of Inmates, and 1 Relief/Supervision when >48)

Correctional Officers must be present while courthouse holding cells are occupied to meet Texas Commission on Jail Standards requirements (See Exhibit C)



## Detention Division at Jail Current





- Current inmate population requires 46 positions to be staffed on each shift
- With 46 positions staffed on each shift we are able to supervise 1025 inmates
- Currently only have staff trained for 43 on night shift
- Ten (10) currently in training and five (5) open positions



## Detention Division at Jail Requested





- On June 12, 2011 our count was 995 inmates
- Ten (10) currently approved Correctional Officer and scheduled to be cut in FY2012
- When counts start to get closer to 1050 the five (5) previously approved positions will be required
- With all previously approved positions we will still be able to supervise 1119 inmates (See Exhibit D and Exhibit E)

Currently, the existing court house requires twenty (20) deputies to maintain all post positions and three (3) deputies to perform rover duties to effectively maintain the safety and security of the court house. At this time, the court house does not have a shift relief factor; therefore the Supervisors have been assuming this responsibility.

The Court House Security Division is currently comprised of sixteen (16) bailiffs, four (4) metal detector operators, three (3) rovers, and three (3) supervisors.

This division consists of three sections:

- 1. Post positions Responsible for daily operations to their assigned stations. Example: Bailiffs and metal detector operators
- 2. Rover Positions Responsible for covering posts, responding to panic alarms and emergencies, crowd control in lobby on large docket days, help tending to a court room with a high profile case and additional responsibilities as described below.
- 3. Supervisors Responsible for daily operations, supervising all deputies assigned to the court house, respond and take action on all emergency situations within the court house perimeter.
  - The supervisors currently help maintain rover duties, additional coverage in high profile cases and relief when post deputies are out for any reason. While supervisors are assisting with these duties they are unable to keep up with their administrative duties.

The current court house rover responsibilities:

1. Covering courts with in-custody defendants (Required 2 deputies - assigned bailiff + rover)

- 2. Covering security for high profile or high risk court proceedings (multiple deputies needed depending on case, but at least 2)
- 3. Assist with booking paperwork for new arrests
- 4. Visiting Judge (Bailiff needed when there is a visiting judge not substituting for another judge)
- 5. Crowd control in lobby for security during large dockets
- 6. Responding to panic alarms and public safety needs
- 7. Relief for metal detector deputy for restroom breaks and lunch
- 8. Staying after hours with courts that have in-custody defendants or high profile cases
- 9. Covering post positions when deputy assigned is on vacation
- 10. Covering post positions when deputy assigned is Sick/FMLA
- 11. Covering post positions when deputy assigned is in training
- 12. Relieving Bailiffs for lunch when courts do not break
- 13. Logging in evidence from completed trials to the courthouse evidence safe
- 14. Preparing and organizing plans for special need jurors and sequestered juries
- 15. Security for Commissioners Court in William B. Travis building after Justice Center is opened.

Due to the current growth, additional posts in the new facility, and increased court dockets seven additional positions are required in the new Justice Center.

### New Justice Center positions:

- 1. One Metal Detector Operator due to adding another metal detector
- 2. One Security Desk Deputy
- 3. One Metal Detector Operator/Crowd Control Deputy

To sufficiently secure the Justice Center and maintain relief for Deputies needing time off a shift relief factor has been calculated. The shift relief factor is based on the number of working days in a calendar year, the amount of vacation time accumulated throughout the year, the amount of sick leave allowed in a calendar year, minimum training hours for a deputy per TCLEOSE training cycle, and other time off. The calculated shift relief factor is 1.17. (Refer to Shift Relief Factor worksheet)

Dear Sheriff Wright:

Since the creation of the Commission on Jail Standards in 1975, and the publication and adoption of minimum standards in December 1976, holding cells located in county facilities, including courthouses, have been subject to inspection. The Attorney General verified this authority in 1982 with the issuance of Attorney General's Opinion MW-559, which is attached for your reference. Since that time, the commission has surveyed and inspected court-holding cells that we are aware of, and included them as part of the annual inspection of the county jail system. However, the Commission is now aware that there may be court-holding cells that have never been inspected. At this time, I am requesting that all counties review their records to ensure that operational court holding cells are properly documented and are being inspected. If a county is unsure of the status of any court holding cells, please contact the Commission and a review of our files will be conducted.

This effort is being undertaken in order to prevent the decertification of a county because of court holding cells that do not comply with minimum jail standards. Court-holding cells in operation prior to December 23, 1976, commonly referred to as "grandfathered", are subject to inspection under Chapter 261 "Existing Construction Rules." Court-holding cells constructed after December 23, 1976 are subject to the requirements of Chapter 259 "New Construction Rules". The requirements of 259.138 have remained virtually the same since they were first adopted, with the only difference being the 4-hour provision that allows the capacity to be calculated based upon linear seating provided in lieu of square footage. If you have any questions regarding this issue, please contact my office.

Opinion No. MW-559

Re: Whether county holding rooms in separate court building are part of jail

You ask whether the Texas Commission on Jail Standards has the authority to require that holding cells in county facilities, separate and distinct from the county jail, comply with minimum jail standards.

Article 2351, V.T.C.S., enumerates the general powers and responsibilities of the county commissioners and requires that they "provide and keep in repair court houses, jails and all necessary public buildings." Article 6872, V.T.C.S., provides that "sheriffs shall have charge and control of the court houses of their respective counties, subject to such regulations as the commissioners court may prescribe.... The specific duties of the county commissioners and the sheriff with respect to their county jails are governed by article 5115.1, V.T.C.S., which created the Texas Commission on Jail Standards. This statute authorizes the Commission on Jail Standards to formulate and enforce minimum jail standards against the county sheriff and county commissioners for the care, custody, and treatment of prisoners and for county jail construction, maintenance, and operation. Article 5115.1, V.T.C.S., in section 2 defines a county jail as "any jail, lockup, or other facility that is operated by or for a county for the confinement of persons accused or convicted of an offense."

A statute should be given a fair and sensible construction in order to carry out the purpose for which it was enacted and should not be construed in such a manner as to nullify or defeat its purpose. Citizens Bank of Bryan v. First State Bank of Hearne, 580 S.W.2d 344, 348 (Tex. 1979); Salas v. State, 592 S.W.2d 653, 655 (Tex. Civ. App. - Austin 1979, no writ); Lopez v. Ramirez, 558 S.W.2d 954, 957 (Tex. Civ. App. - San Antonio 1977, no writ).

The enactment of article 5115.1, V.T.C.S., makes clear the legislative intent that the Texas Commission on Jail Standards improve conditions of confinement for county jail inmates. See Texas

### CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

### TITLE 1. CODE OF CRIMINAL PROCEDURE

CHAPTER 36. THE TRIAL BEFORE THE JURY

Art. 36.24. OFFICER SHALL ATTEND JURY. The sheriff of the county shall furnish the court with a bailiff during the trial of any case to attend the wants of the jury and to act under the direction of the court. If the person furnished by the sheriff is to be called as a witness in the case he may not serve as bailiff.
