

**Resolution In Support of Funding for Probation and Detention Centers**

**WHEREAS**, there has been an ongoing debate around raising the age of being tried as a juvenile to 21. An increase in age would increase the burden on County Probation & Detention Services; and,

**WHEREAS**, in Texas, a juvenile is anyone who is at least 10 years old, but is not yet 17 years old; and

**WHEREAS**, those in support of raising the age of juveniles to 21 refer to research showing that the human brain does not reach full development and maturity until mid-20s; and

**WHEREAS**, it is also argued that a juvenile trial would allow law-breakers to seek rehabilitation rather than being jailed; and

**WHEREAS**, other arguments push to match drinking age and the age to purchase tobacco with age of juveniles; and,

**WHEREAS**, projections show that increasing the age of juveniles to just 19 would increase the population of 17 year olds in Fort Bend’s detention center from 10% to 33% by 2020 thus needing additional funding to meet such mandates; and,

**WHEREAS**, community supervision and corrections departments have experienced significant revenue and fee loss due to the COVID-19 pandemic while performing major services to provide safe and effective ways for probation please to be taken in Court

**NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF FORT BEND COUNTY, TEXAS, THAT:**

This 15<sup>th</sup> day of December 2020, the **Fort Bend County Commissioners Court**, meeting as a body in Richmond, Texas:

1. Supports additional state funding for juvenile probation and detention centers if the age is raised to 21
2. Opposes budget cuts to local Community Supervision and Corrections Departments
