

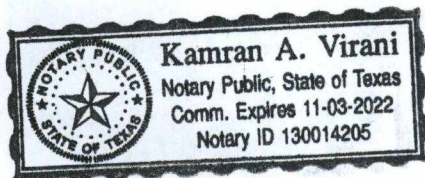

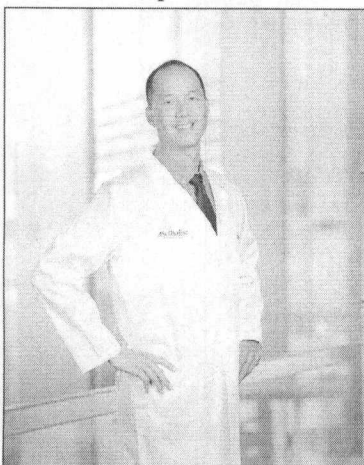

Houston Methodist Sugar Land Hospital physician uses minimally invasive technology to treat septal deviations

A Sugar Land ENT is the first in the Houston Methodist system to use an innovative technology to assist in the treatment of a septal deviation.

In March, board-certified otolaryngologist Brian Wang, M.D., of Houston Methodist ENT Specialists at Sugar Land removed a 3-centimeter bone spur from a patient's septum with the help of the Relieva Tract Nasal Dilation System, which uses a high-pressure balloon to open space in the nasal cavity, increasing access for the physician to work.

This technology makes it possible for physicians to repair septal deviations, address bone spurs and other forms of nasal blockages in a clinic setting, rather than in a hospital operating room.

"We can now repair these issues with a minimally invasive procedure that can be performed under oral sedation in the office rather than general anesthesia in the operating room," said Wang.

"For patients, it's more convenient, less expensive and reduces recovery times."

Balloon technology is now being used in a variety of otolaryngology procedures, including the treatment of turbinate hypertrophy – an enlarged outgrowth of the nasal sidewall bone – and different types of stenosis, or narrowing of the sinuses, salivary ducts and trachea.

Patients with septal deviations/spurs and turbinate hypertrophy may suffer from

blocked nasal passages, which can make breathing difficult, and they often experience recurring sinus infections and even headaches.

Traditional septoplasty involves trimming, repositioning and sometimes removing cartilage or bone through incisions inside the nose or between the nostrils.

This advanced technology eliminates the need for extensive surgery. The patient is given a sedative and local anesthetic, and the instrument is inserted into the nostril.

Once in place, the high-pressure balloon is inflated, pushing against bones, cartilage and mucus membrane to straighten the septum and open the airway.

The tool can then be inserted into the other nostril to push in the opposite direction if needed, loosening the bone and mobilizing any bone spurs for removal via incision.

"Whether their condition is genetic or the result of trauma, patients often put off seeking treatment because they see it as difficult and painful," said Wang.

"But today we have new technology that enables us to treat nasal blockages without major surgery. There's no reason to suffer."

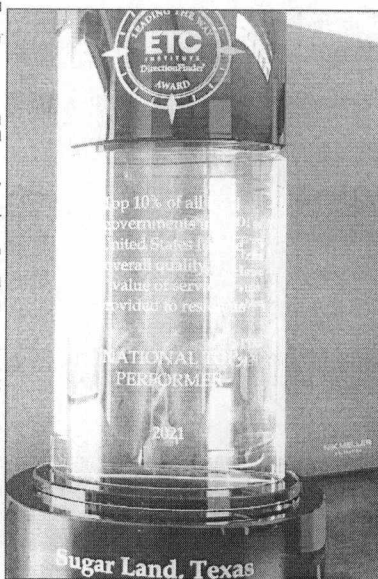

The results of Sugar Land's 2020 Citizen Satisfaction Survey show that 98 percent of respondents rated the city as an "excellent" or "good" place to live and 97 percent rated the city as "excellent" or "good" place to raise children.

In addition to ranking in the top 10 percent overall, the city of Sugar Land also rated in the top 10 percent of all cities in the following areas:

Road rage suspect in custody

On Wednesday, June 2, 2021, at 4:27 a.m., the Rosenberg Police Department received an emergency call for service regarding a shooting on 169 near Spur 10.

The caller stated a male victim had been shot and further provided the dispatch center with a description of the alleged suspect vehicle.

Officers arrived to the location and located a 50 year old male with a single gunshot wound to his thigh.

Officers further observed the victim's vehicle to have a single gunshot entry to the driver side door.

The victim was transported by medics to the hospital where he received treatment for a broken femur as a result of the gunshot.

The initial statement given by the victim indicated the suspect struck his vehicle while driving south on I-69. The suspect then proceeded to pull up alongside of the victim and fired a single round from a handgun which ultimately struck the victim's vehicle and his leg.

Rosenberg Police Detectives arrived to the scene and immediately began a canvass of the area. Detective

Rogers and Detective Flores located a vehicle matching the suspect vehicle at the Dollar Tree Distribution Center located 1210 Hartledge Road, Rosenberg, Texas, 77471.

The Detectives further observed this vehicle to have damage, corroborating the victim's initial statement. Detective Rogers and Detective Flores located the owner of the vehicle and identified him as Michael Borrego (47) from Sugar Land.

Michael Borrego stated he and the victim were involved in an accident on I-69 and

ultimately confessed to firing a round from his handgun towards the victim as a result of the accident.

Michael Borrego then continued on his route to work at the Dollar Tree Distribution Center. Detectives obtained an arrest warrant for Michael Borrego for the alleged offense of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon which was signed by Judge Tamecia Glover.

Michael Borrego was taken into custody and transported to the Fort Bend County Jail where he will be arraigned.

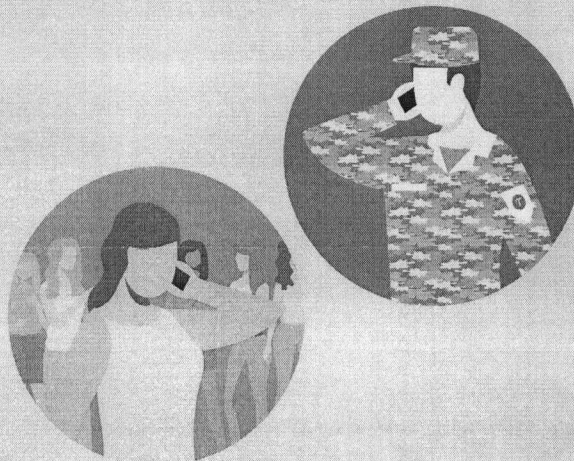
